



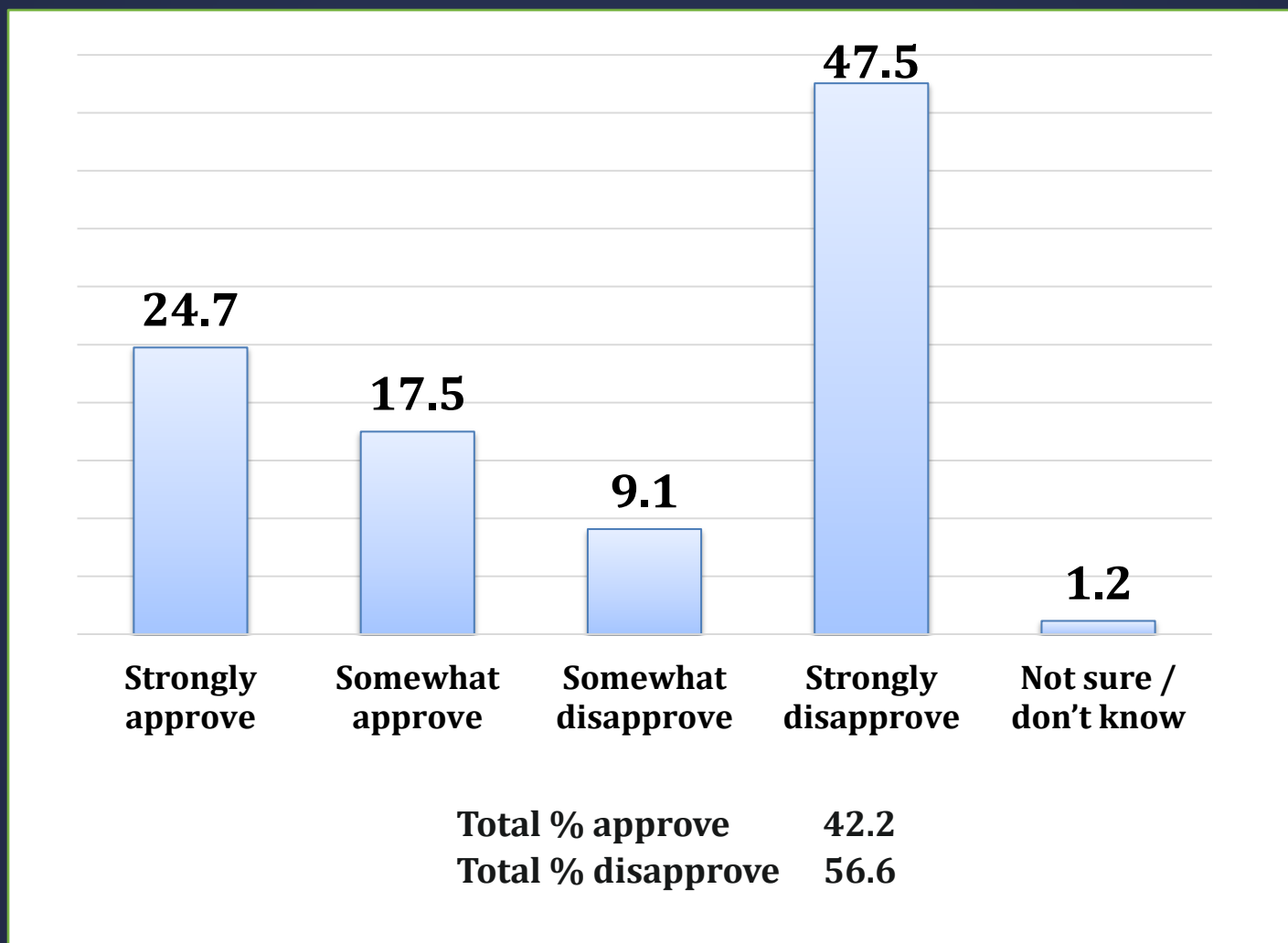

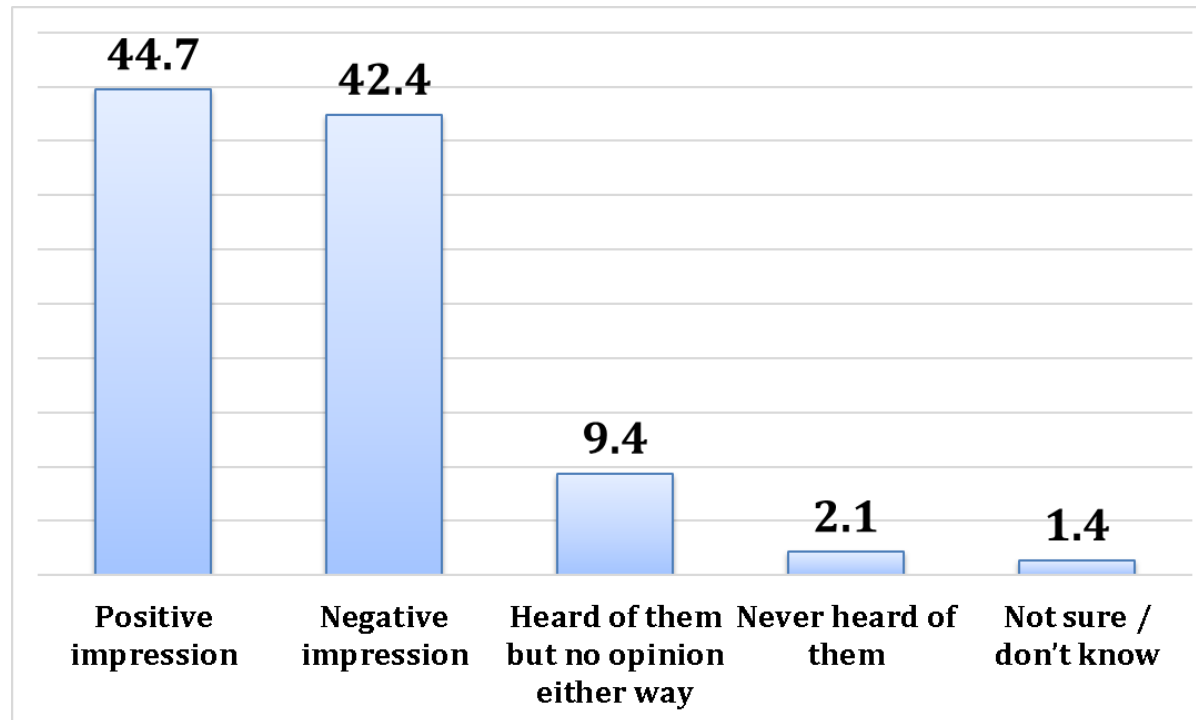

Q1. How would you rate the job performance of President Donald Trump?

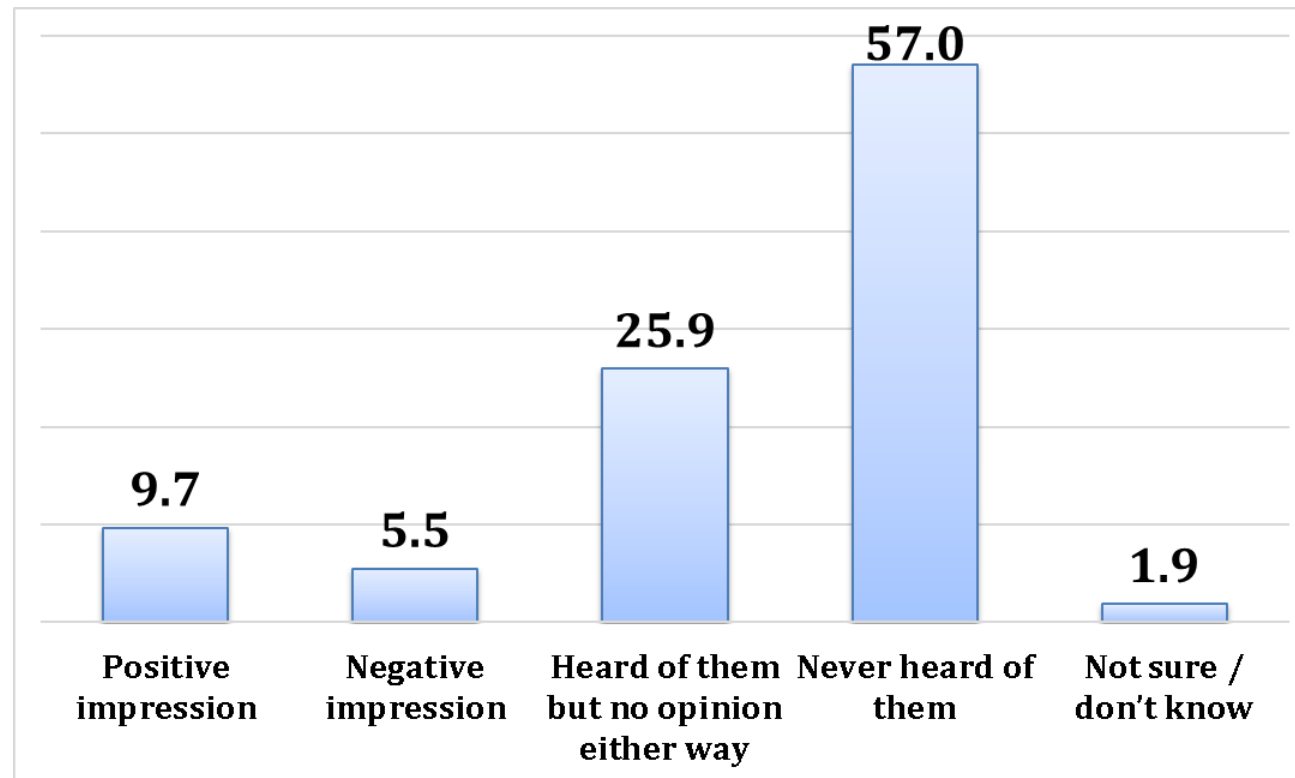


Q2. How would you rate the job performance of Governor Kate Brown?



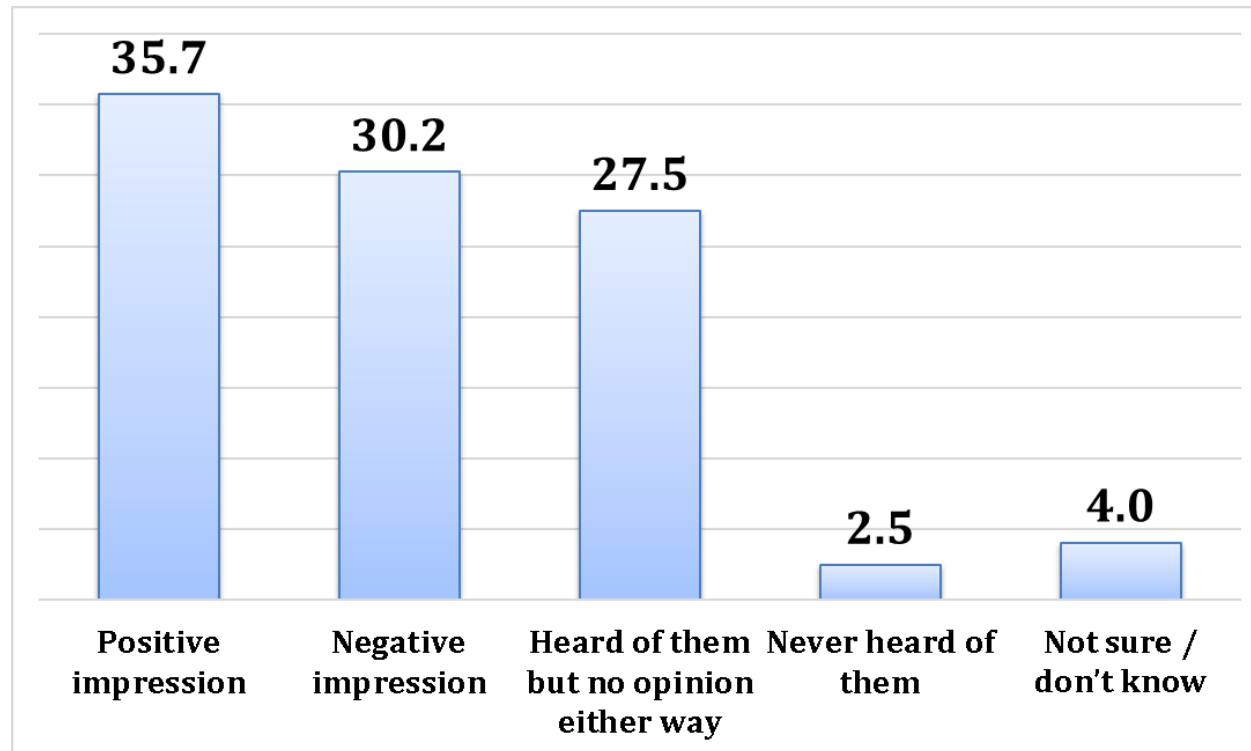

Q3. How would you rate the job performance of State Representative Knute Buehler?



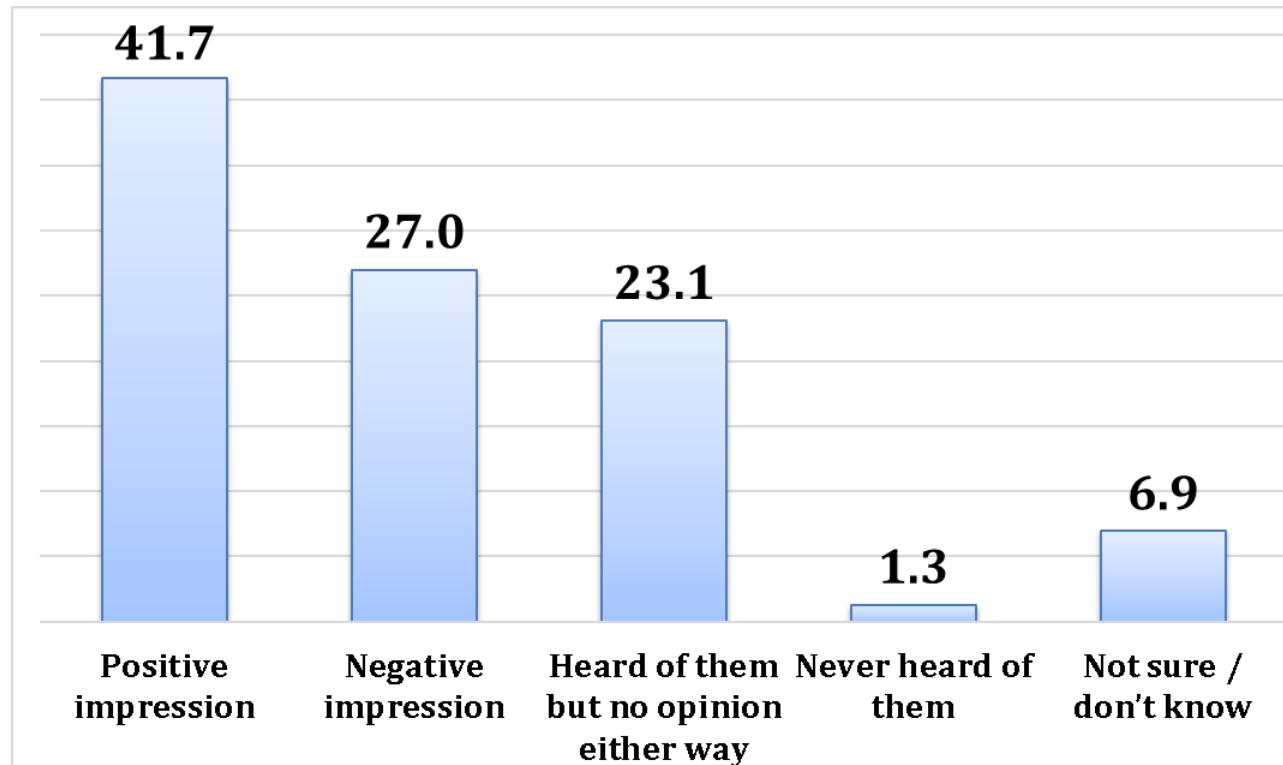

Q4. How would you rate the job performance of The Oregon State Legislature?



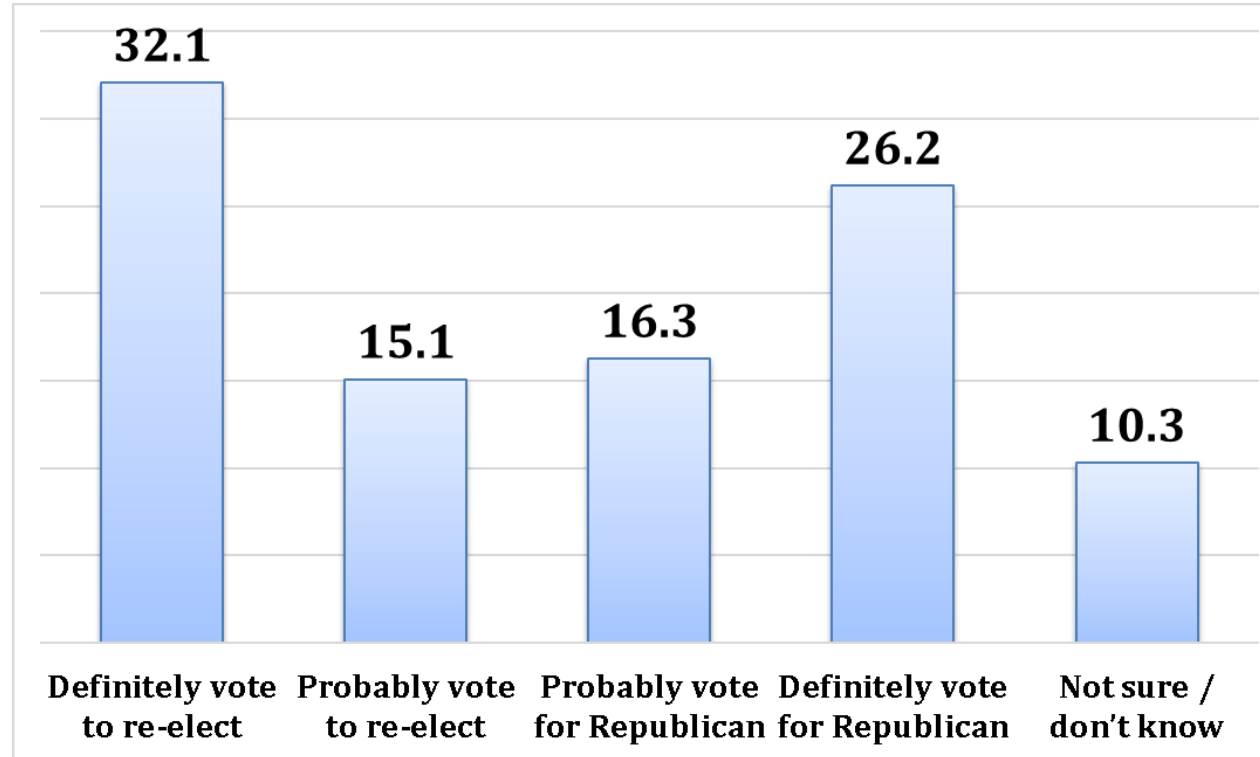

Q5. How would you rate the job performance of Oregon State Government Agencies?



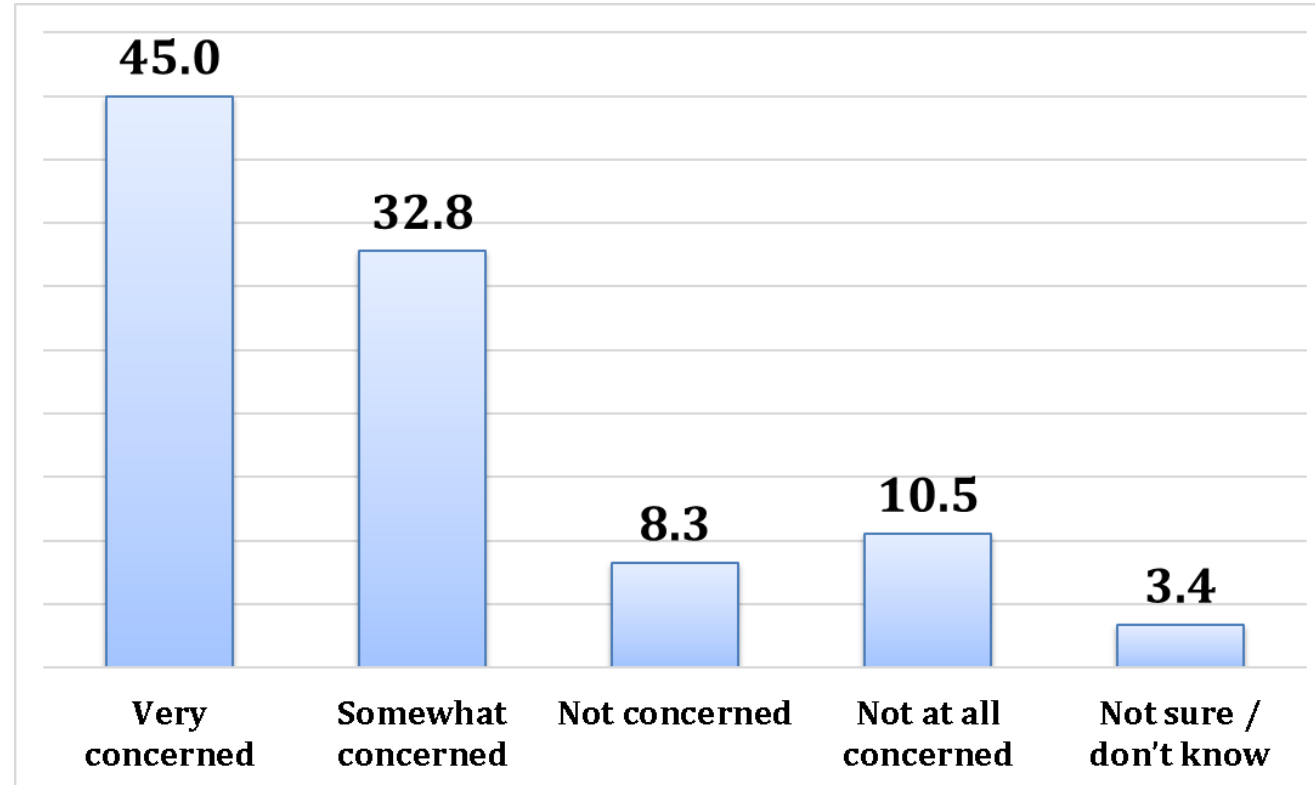

Q6. If the election for Governor of Oregon was held today, would you vote to re-elect Kate Brown, a Democrat, or would you vote for the Republican candidate?



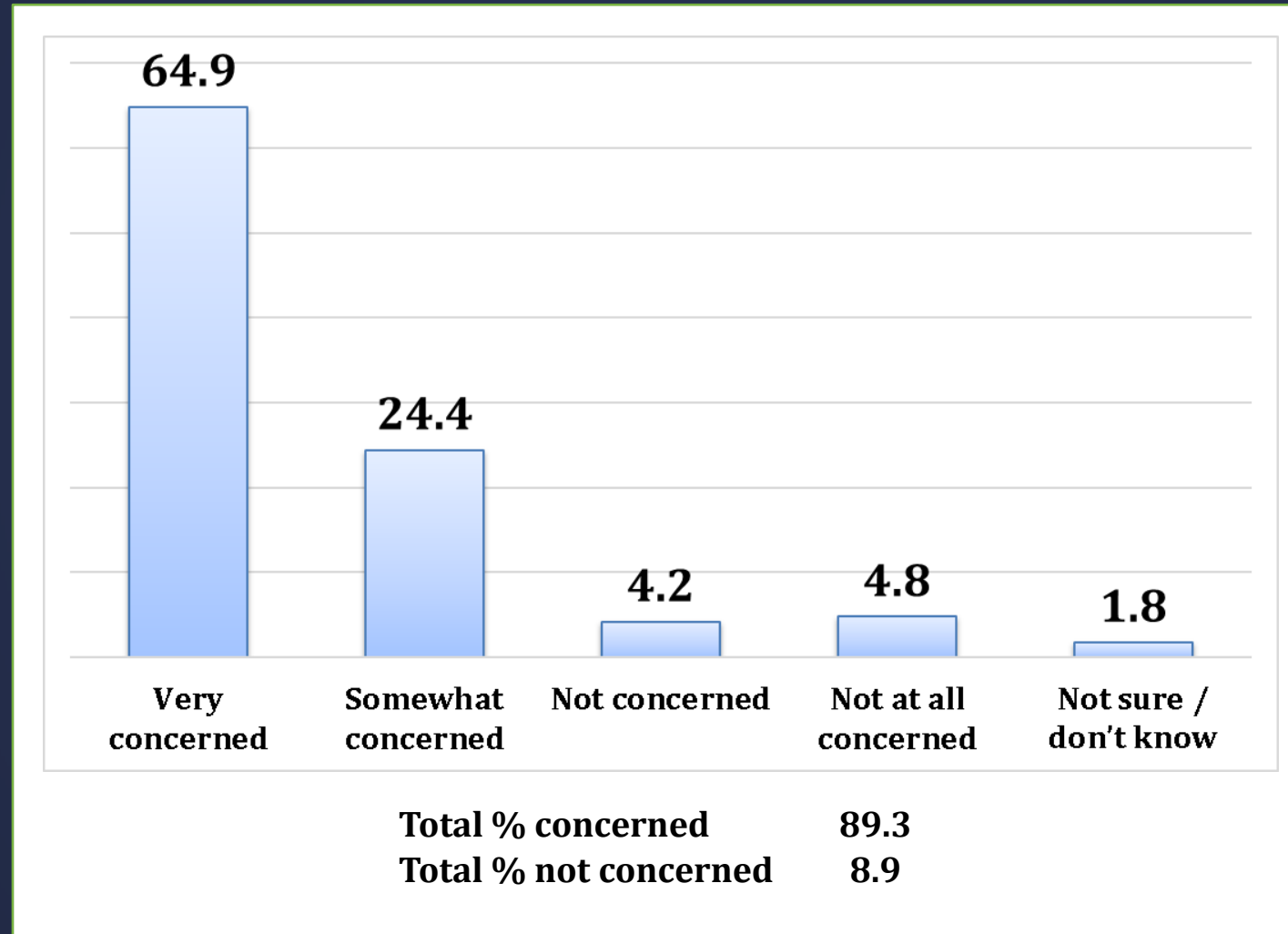

Q7. The Public Employee retirement system, known as PERS, is currently underfunded by an estimated \$25 billion. How concerned are you about the PERS deficit?

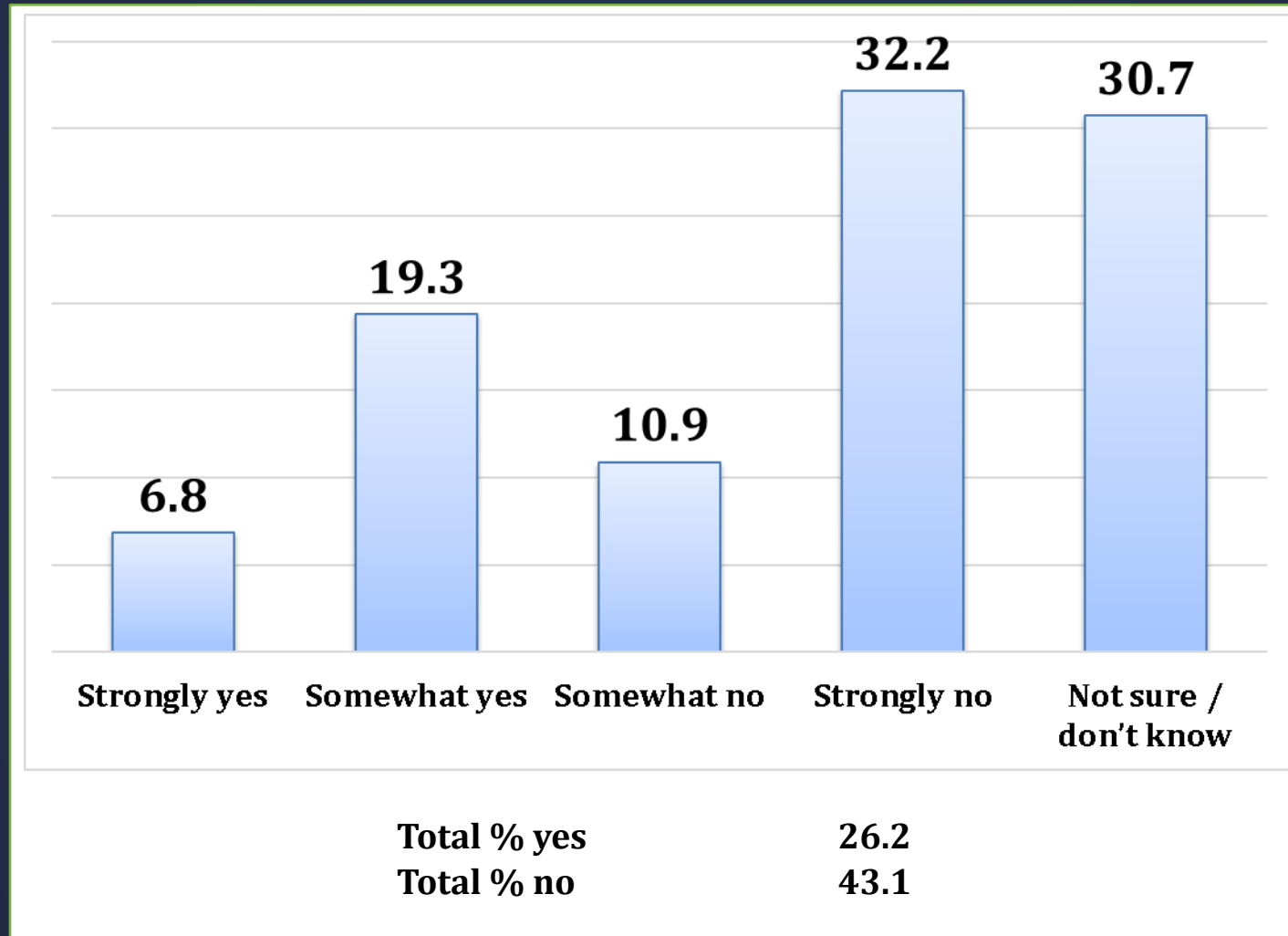

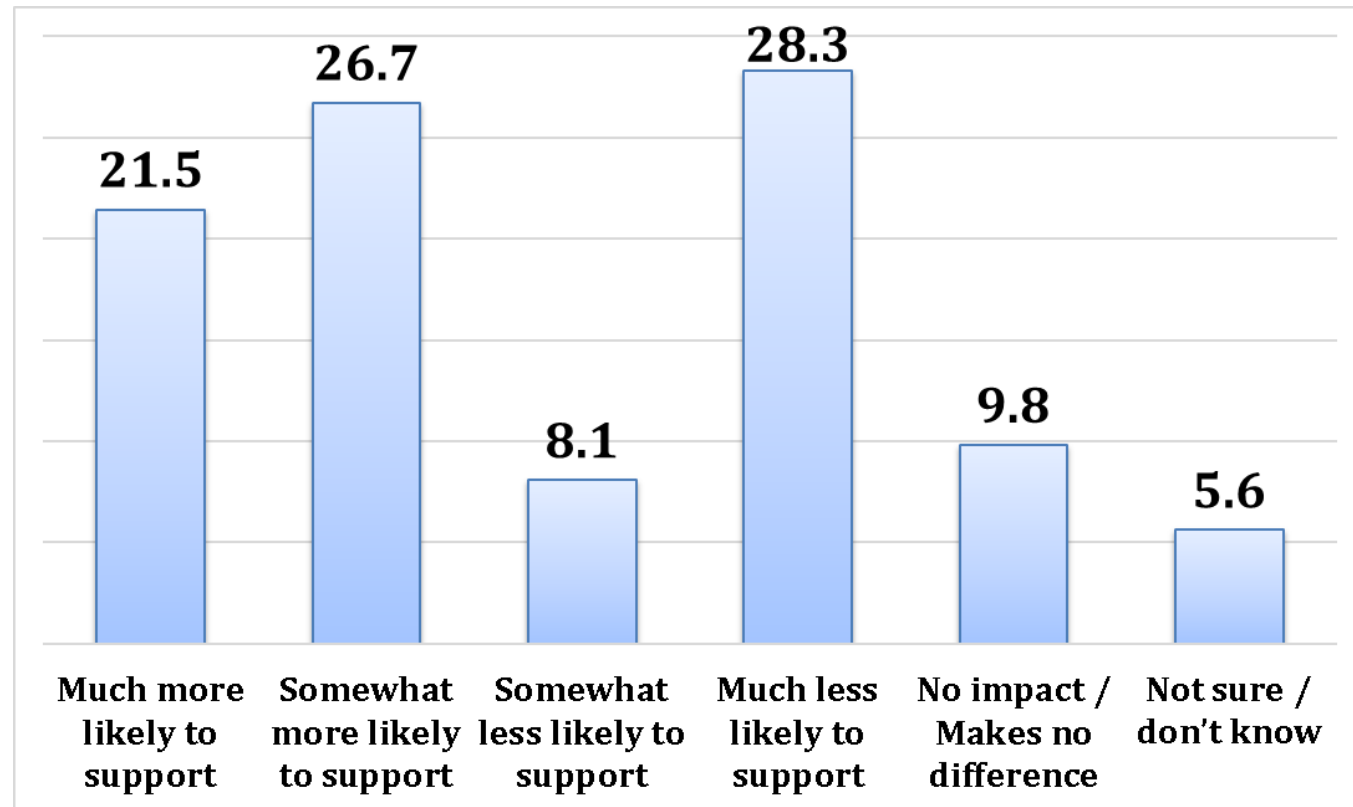

Q9. Do you believe Kate Brown has shown leadership on the PERS issue?



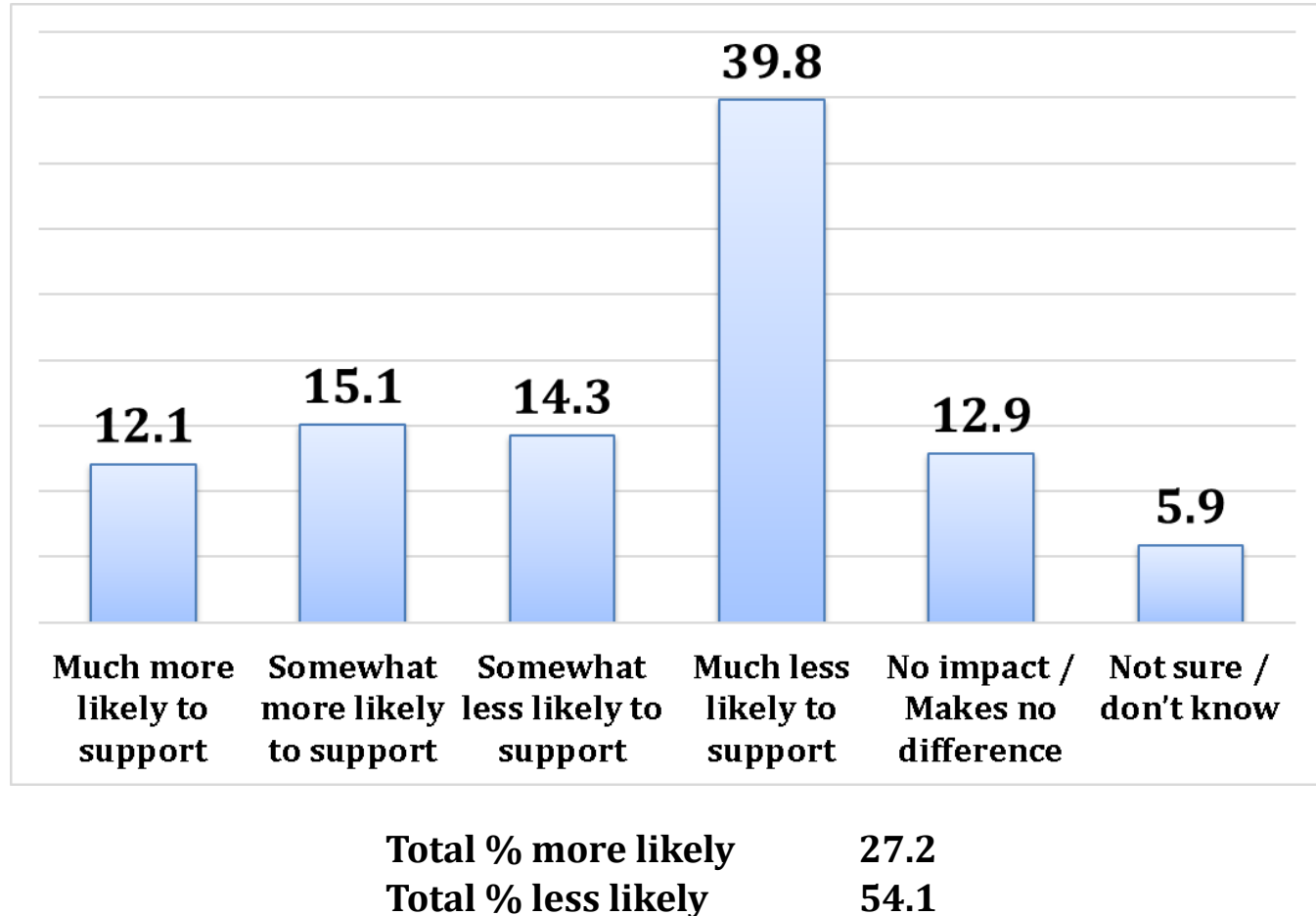

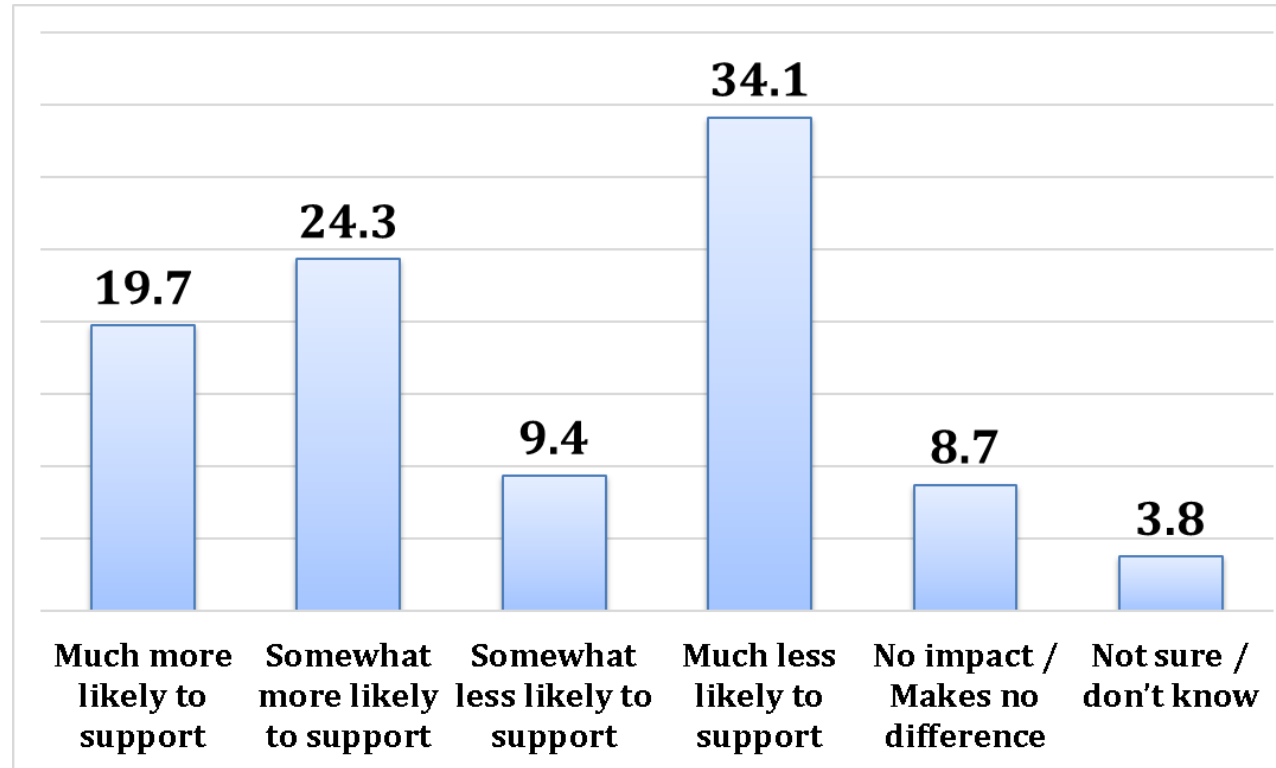

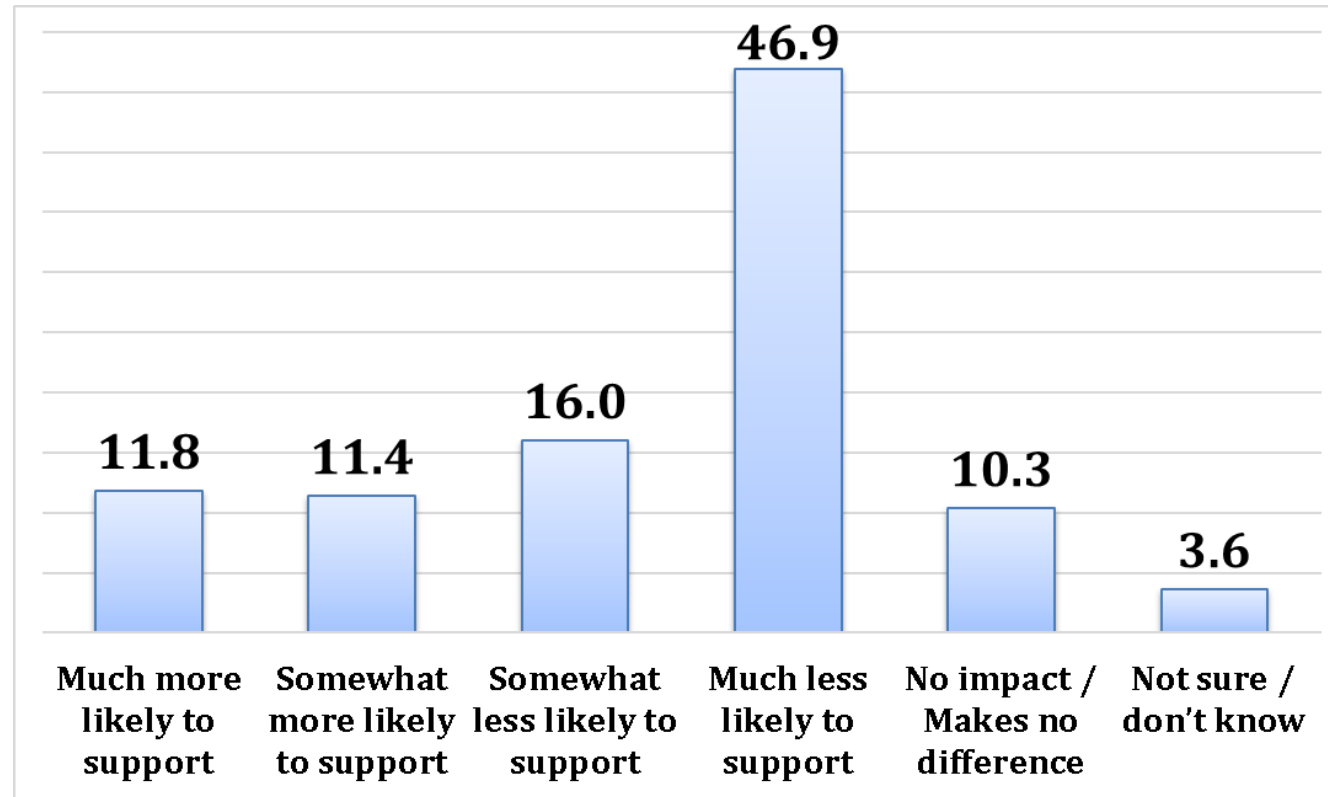

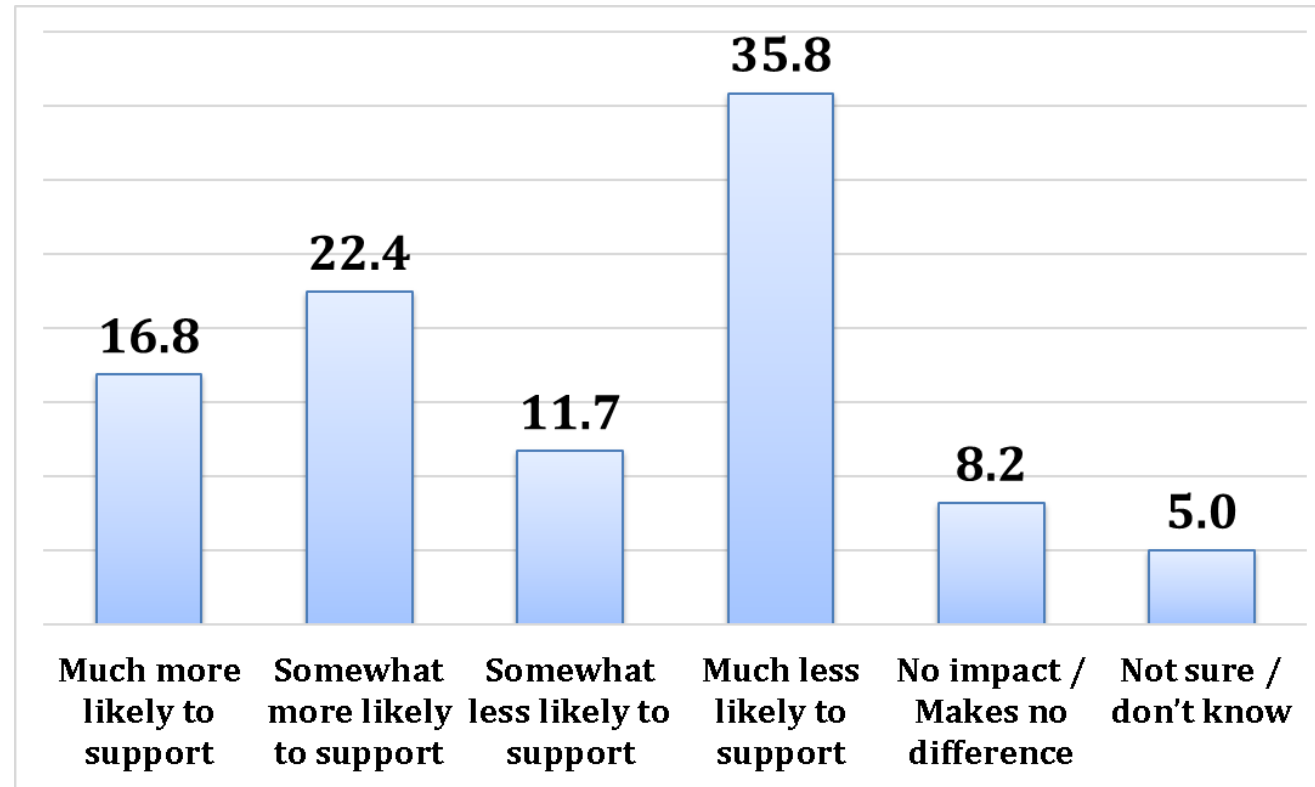

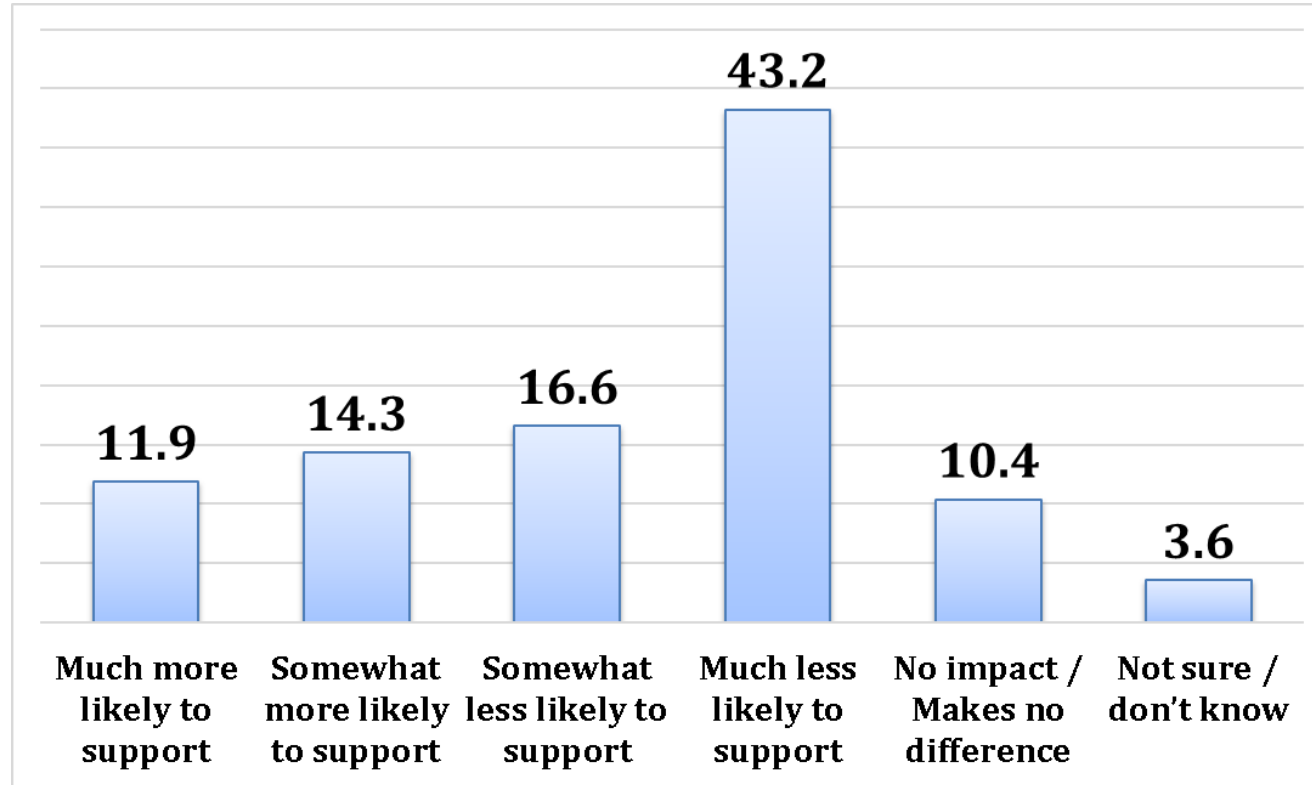

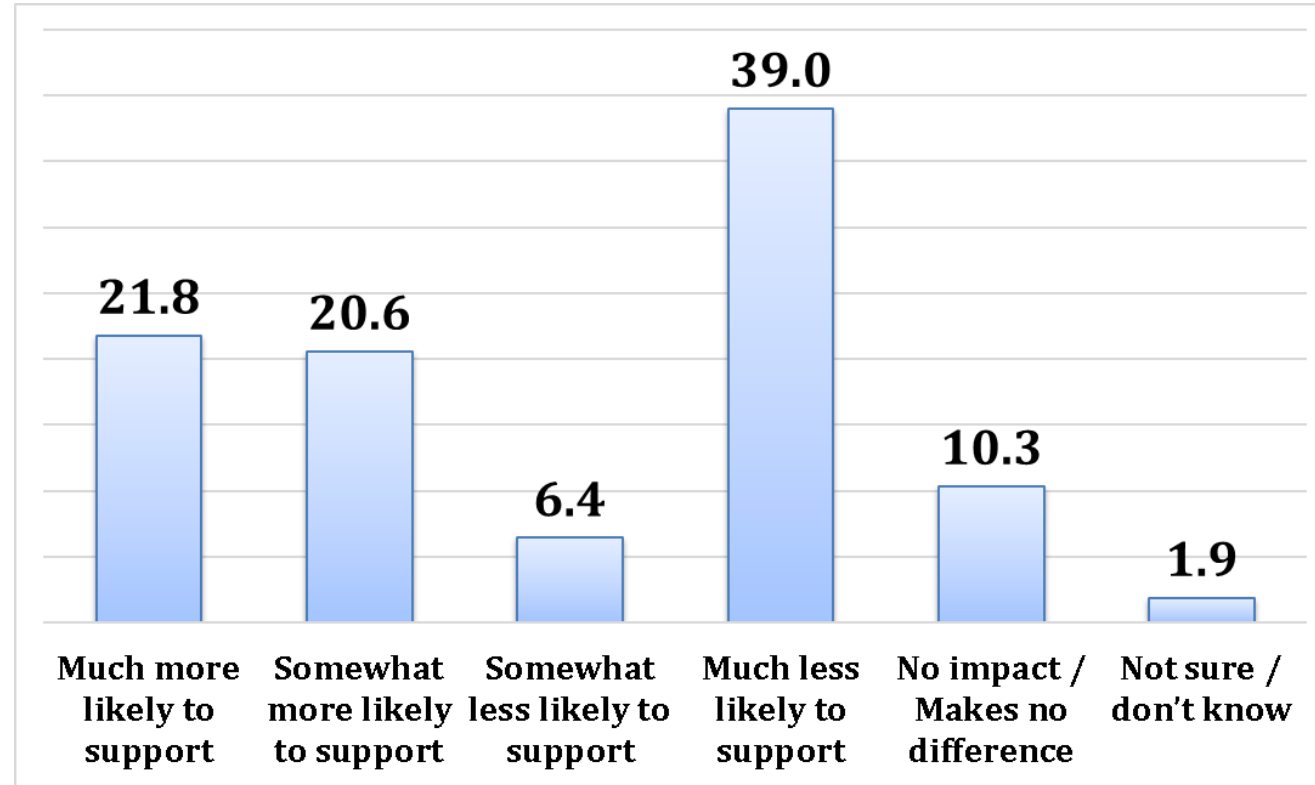

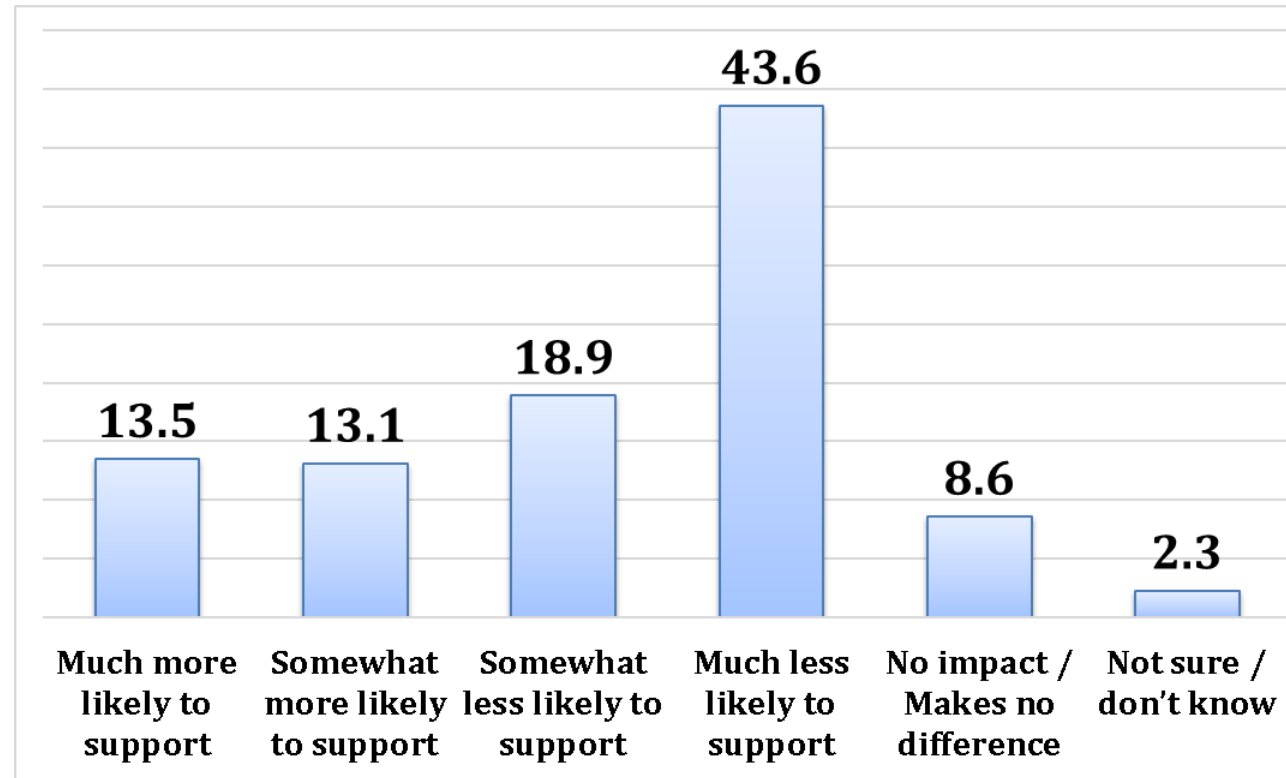

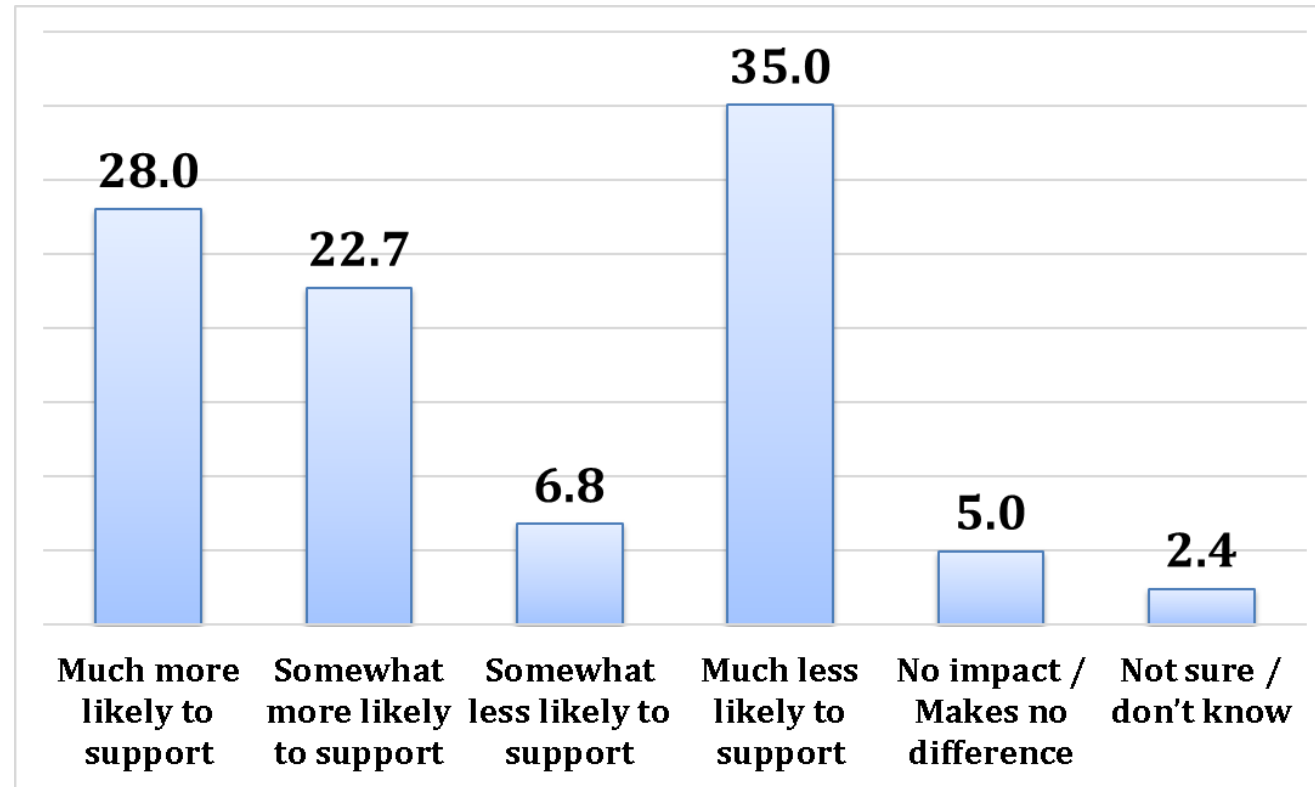

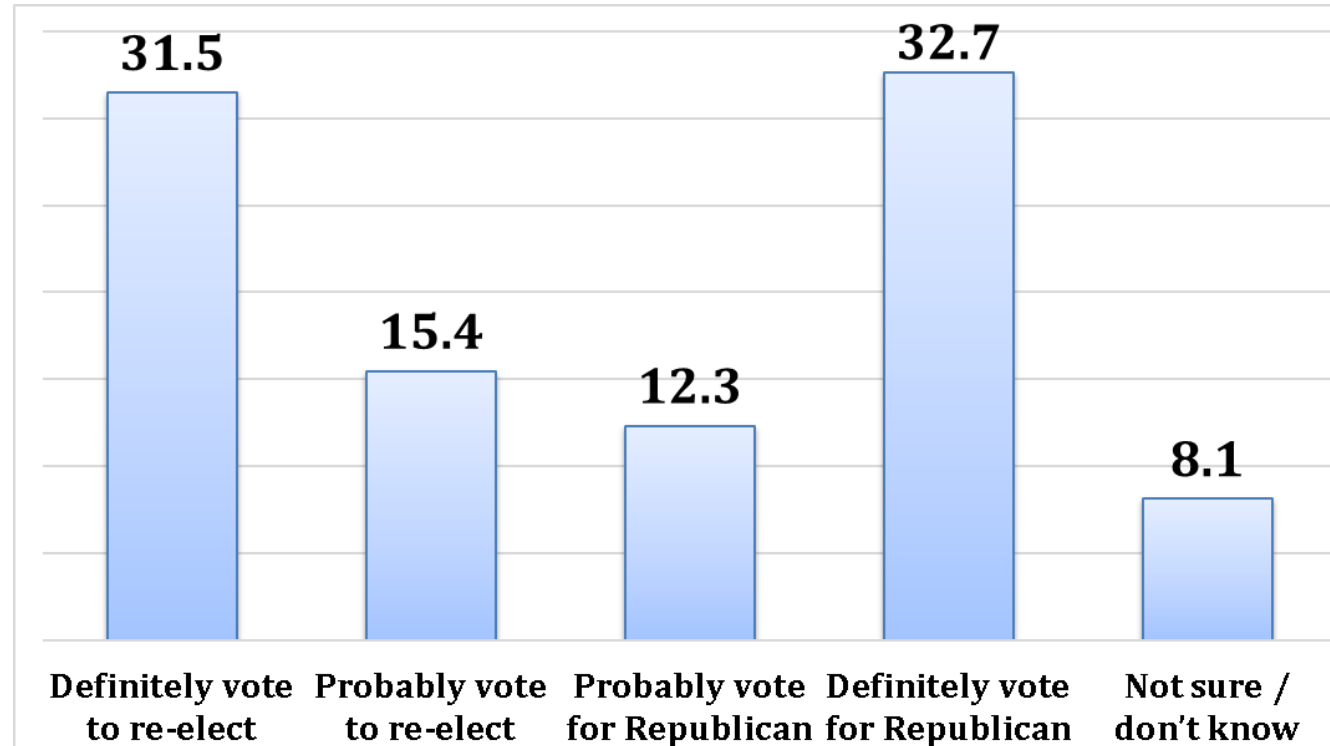

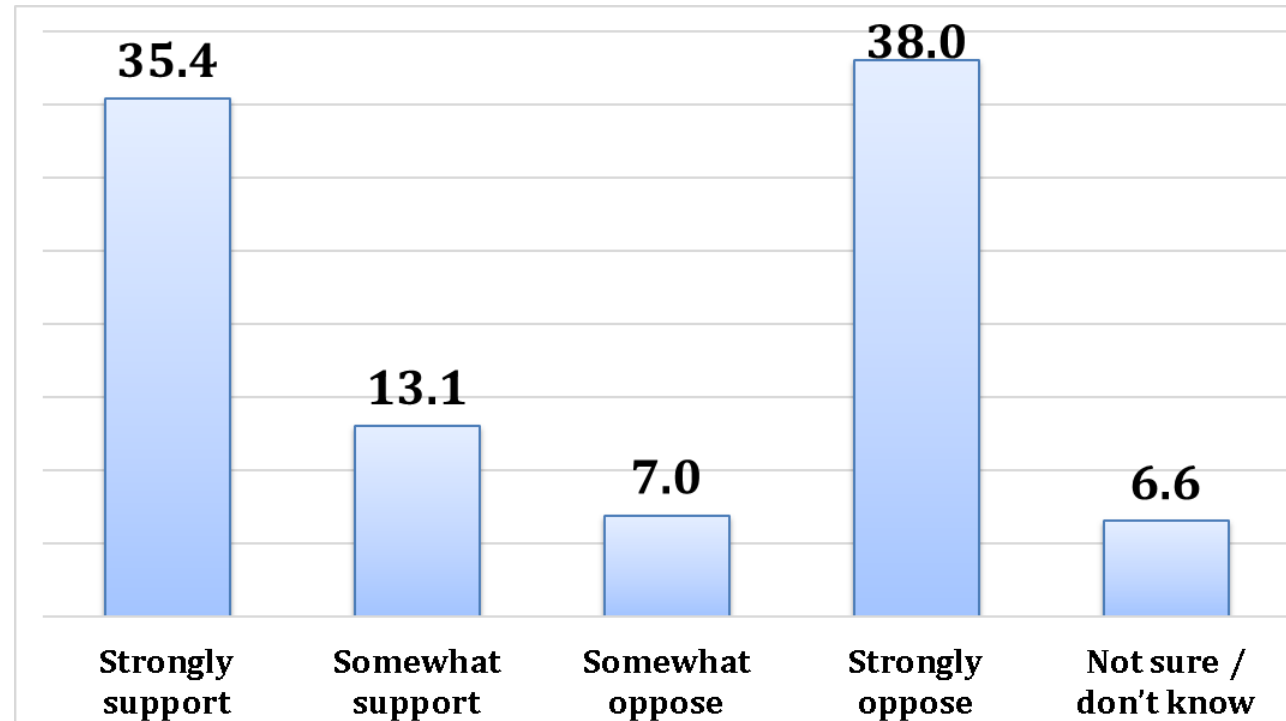

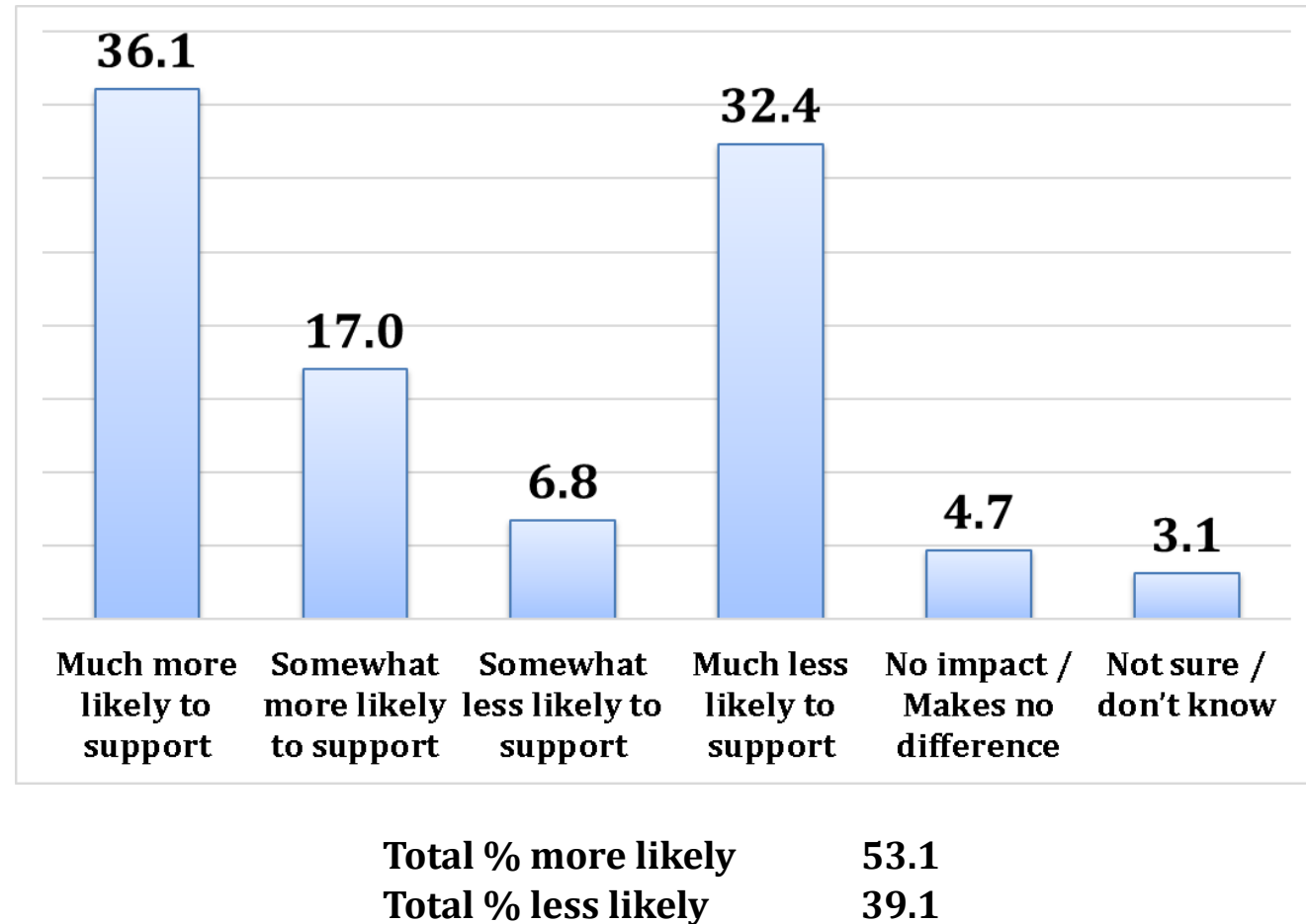

Q20. Do you support or oppose sanctuary laws in Oregon?

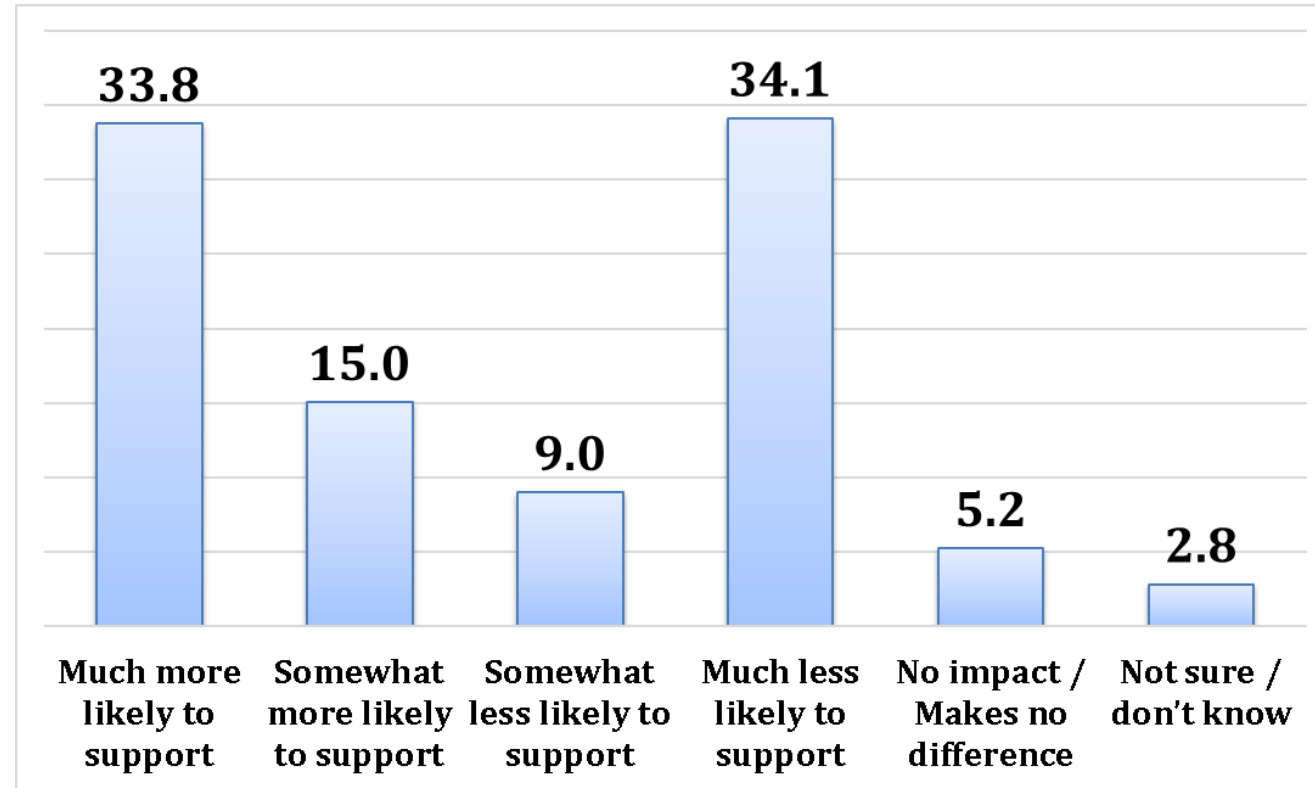

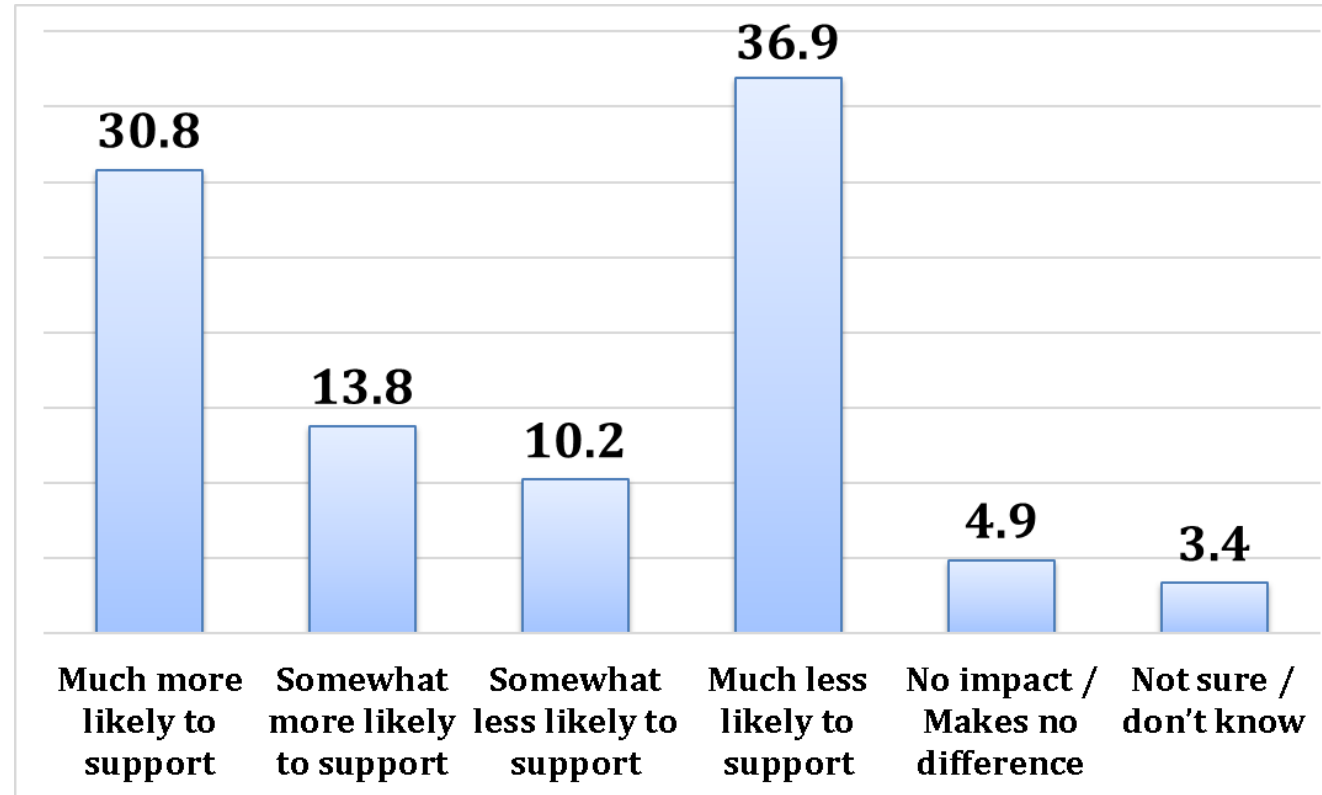

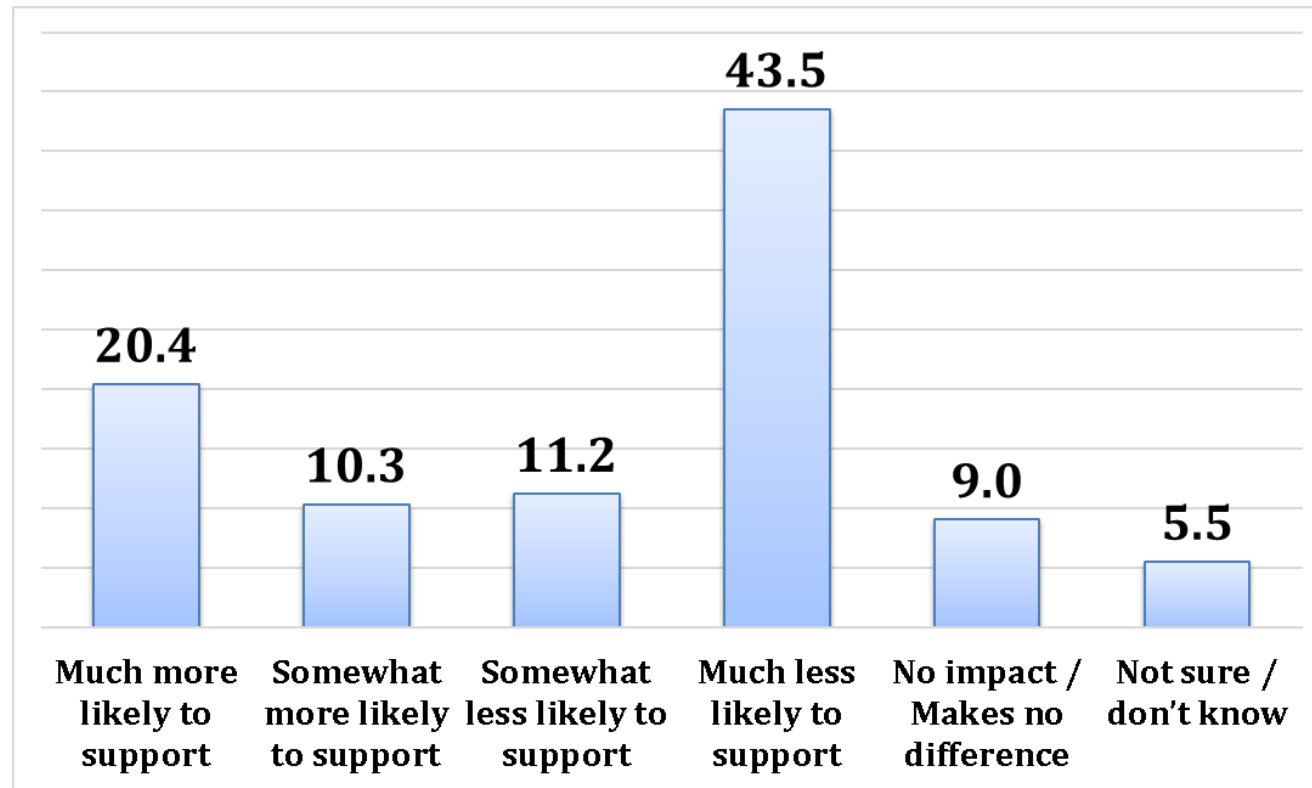

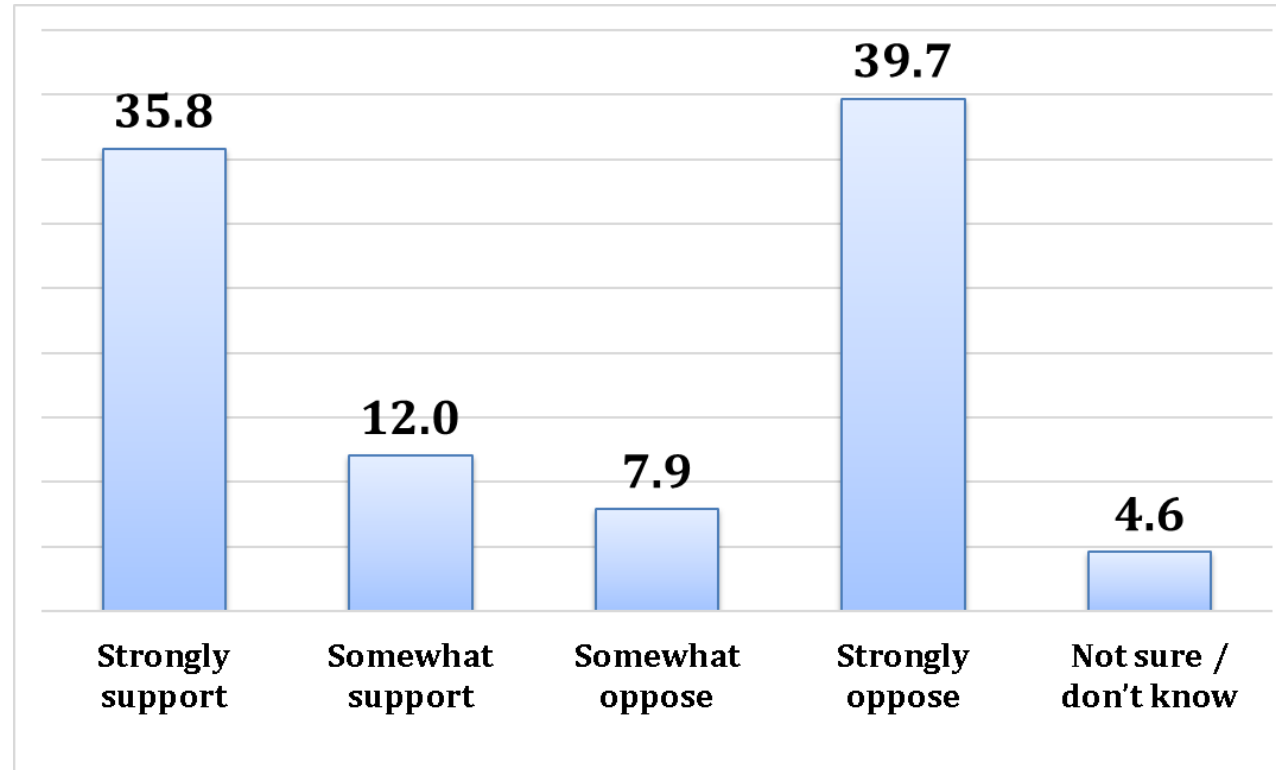

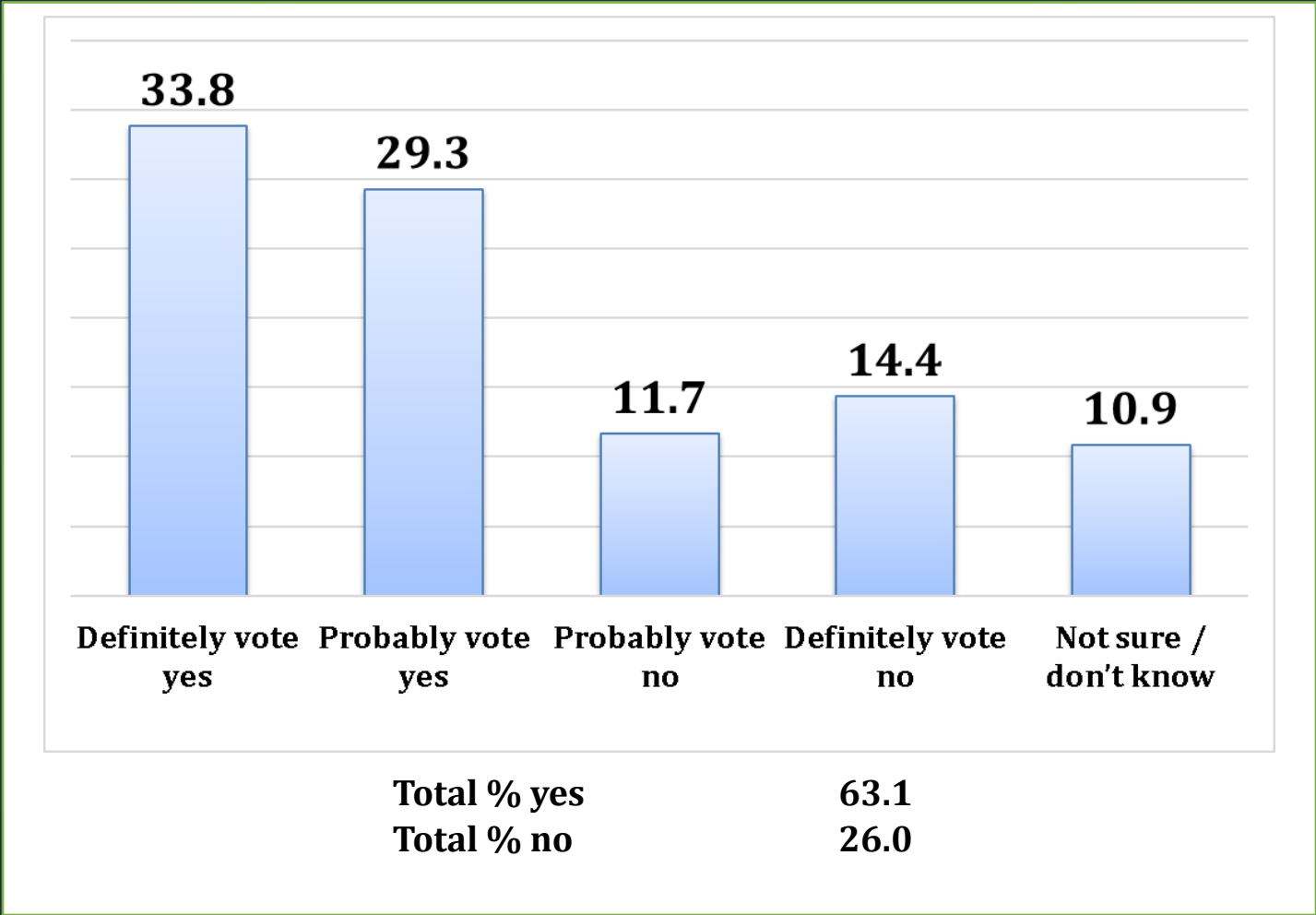

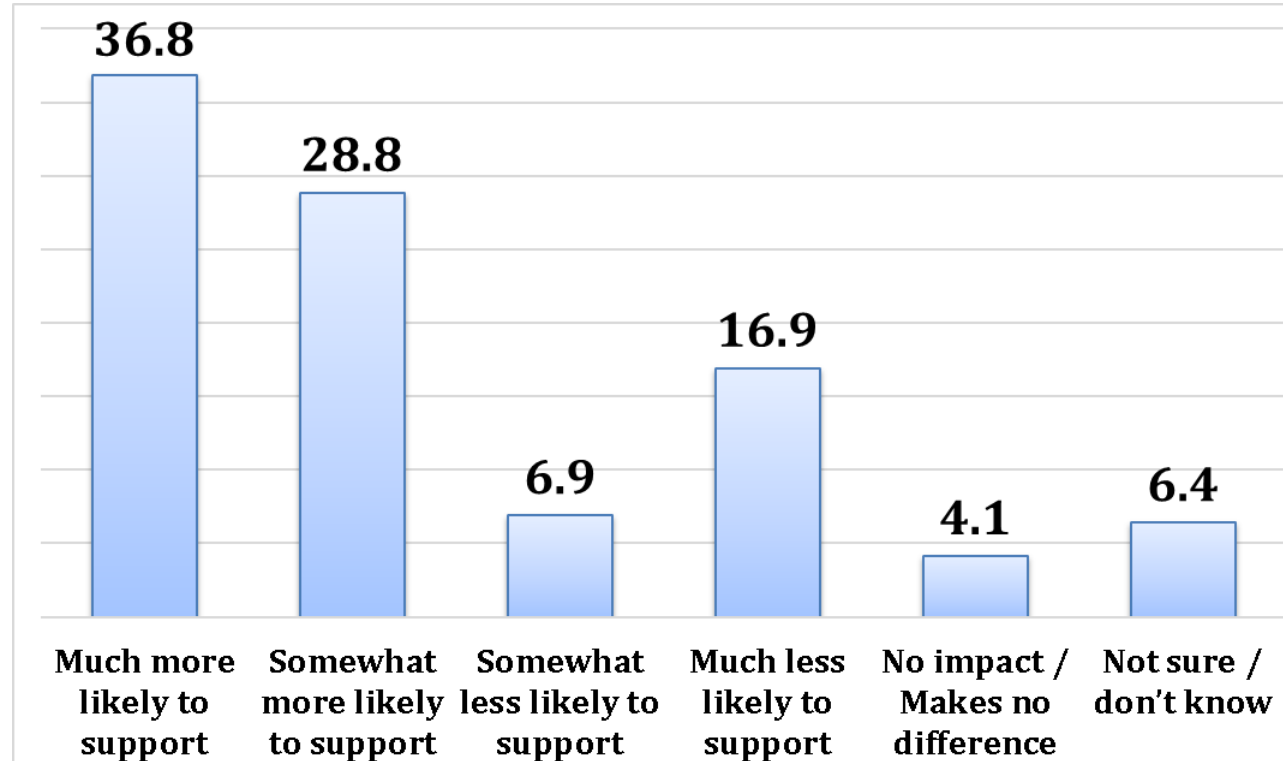
Q26. We have one last topic we would like to ask you about. This January there will be a special election on a ballot measure. Here is the exact language of the ballot measure:

Considering this, if the election was held today on the ballot measure, would you vote yes or no?

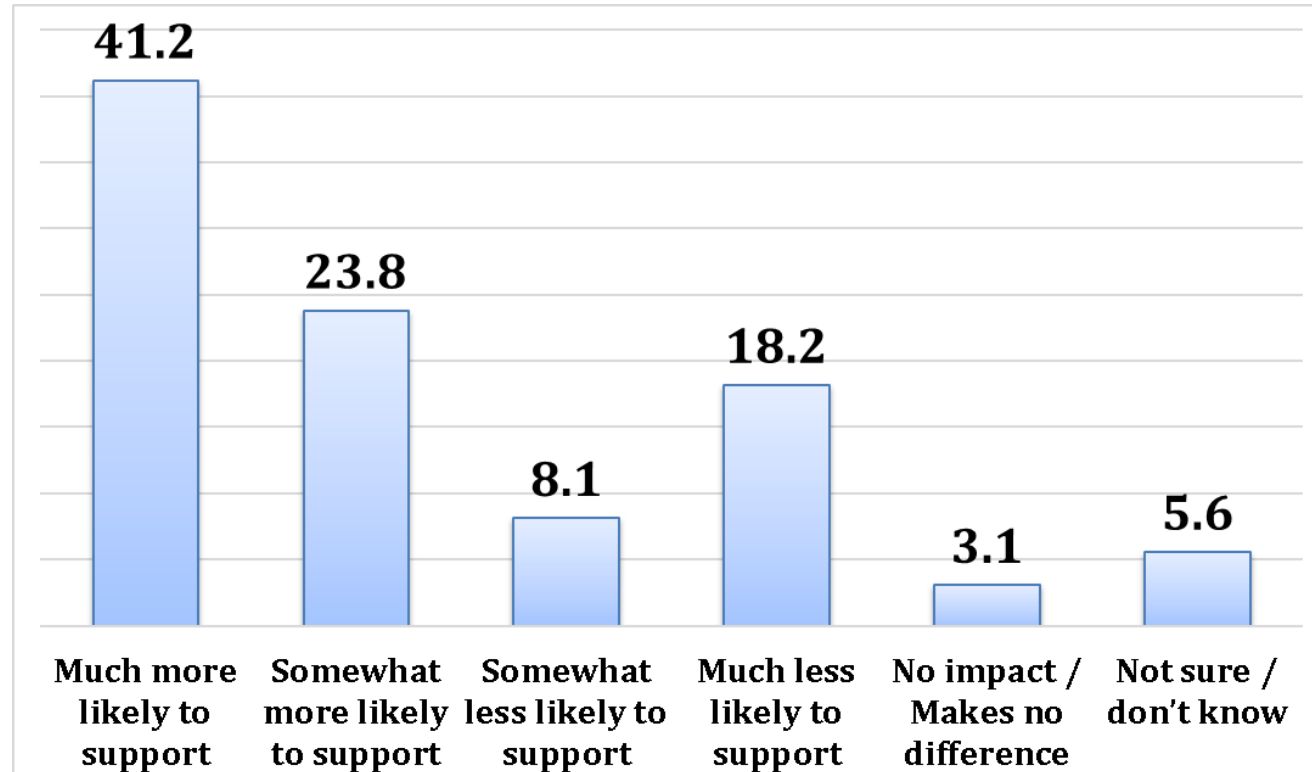

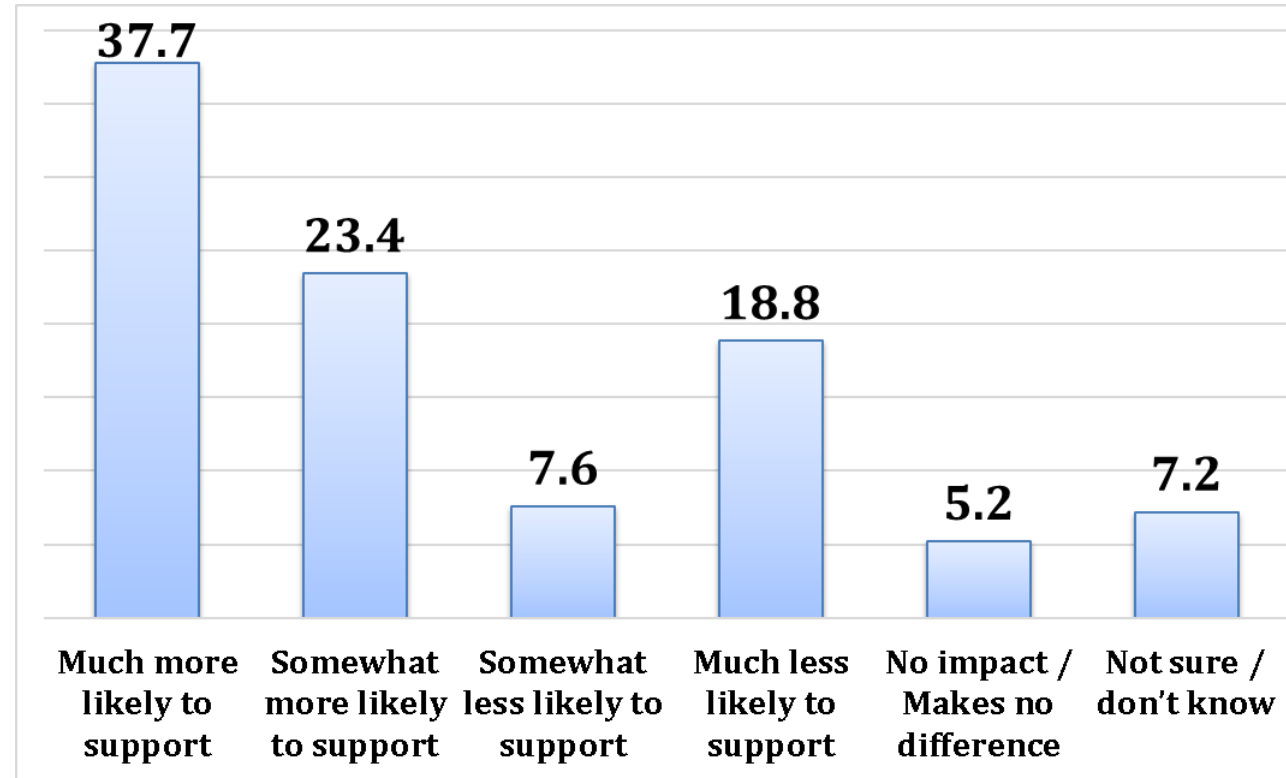

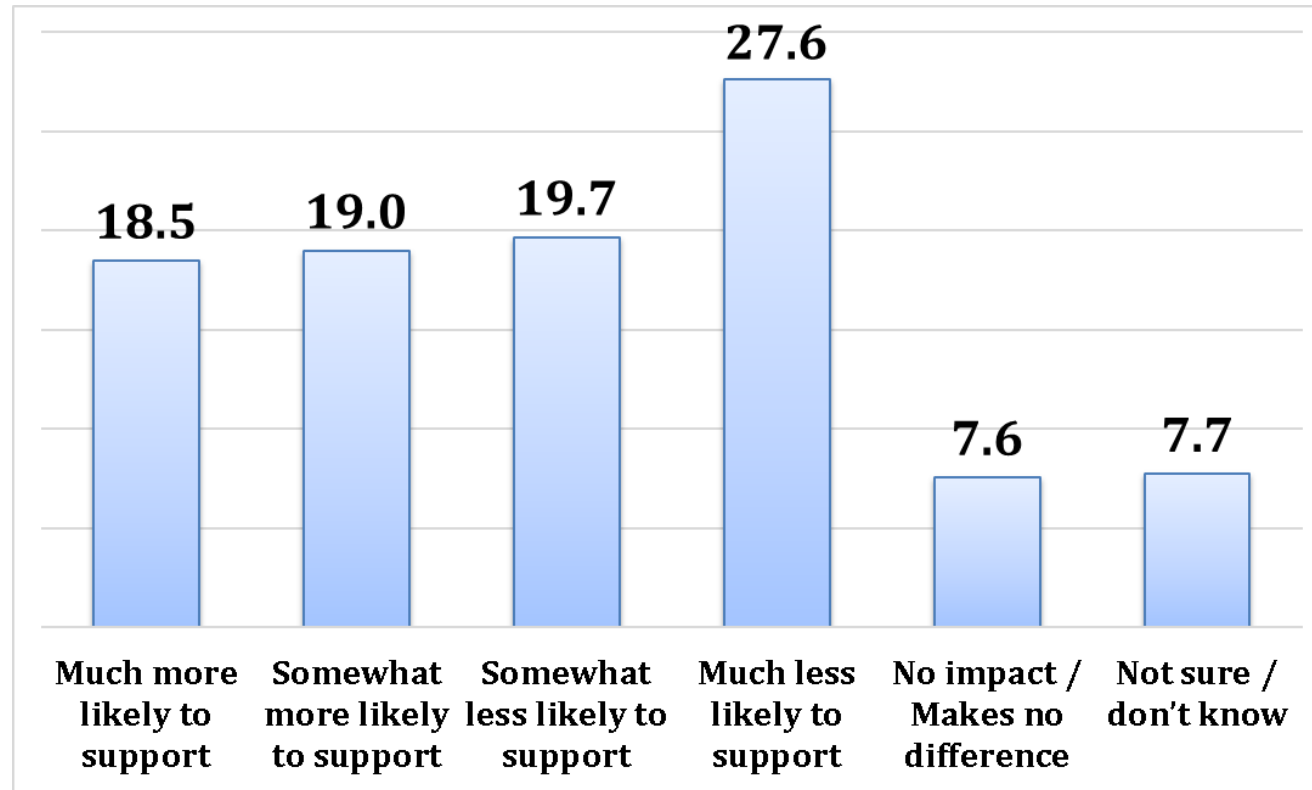

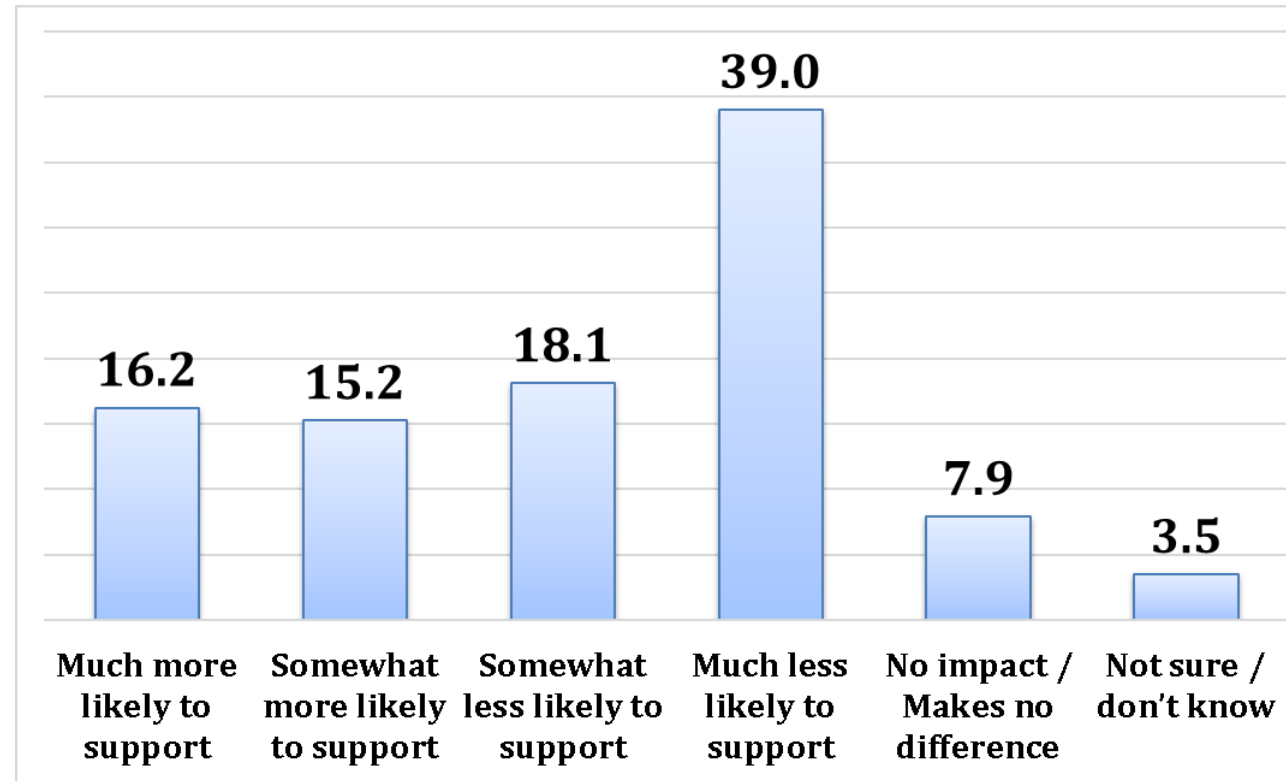

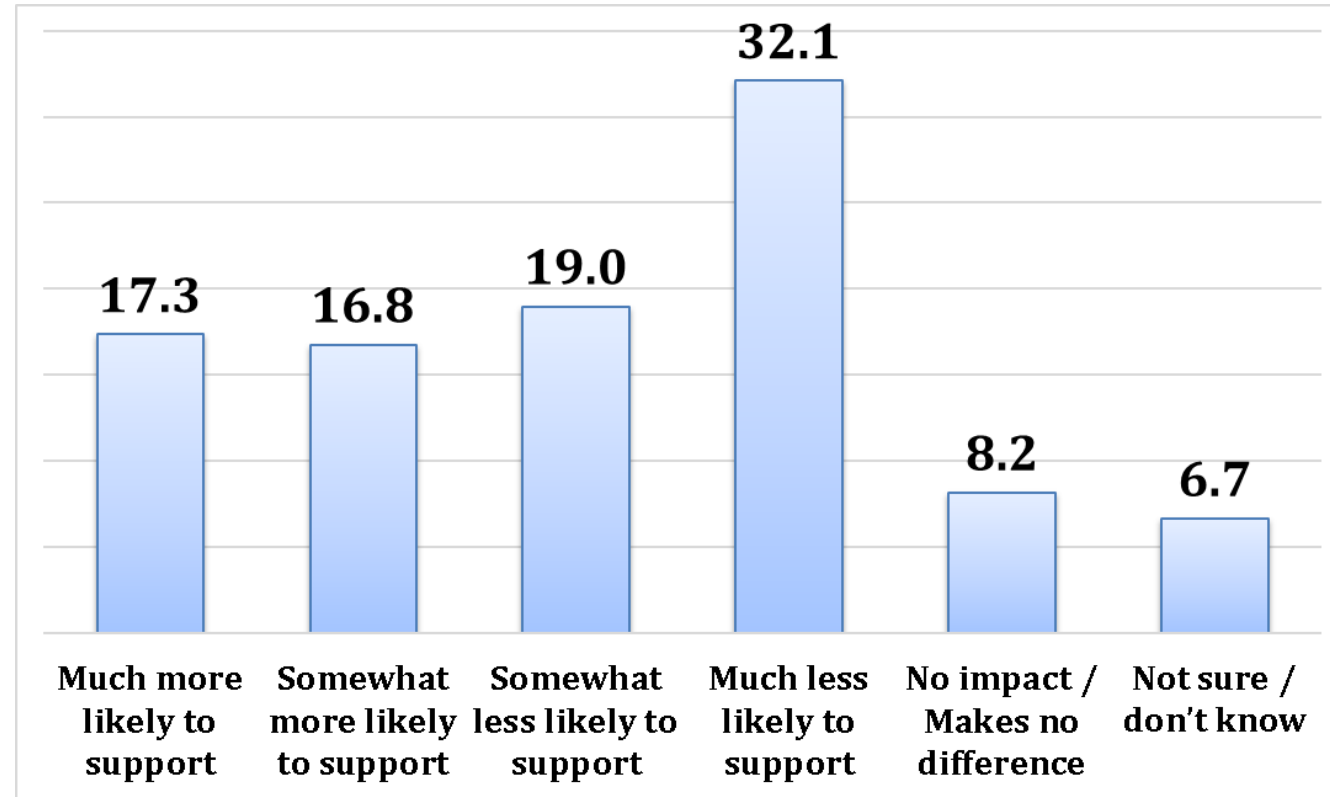

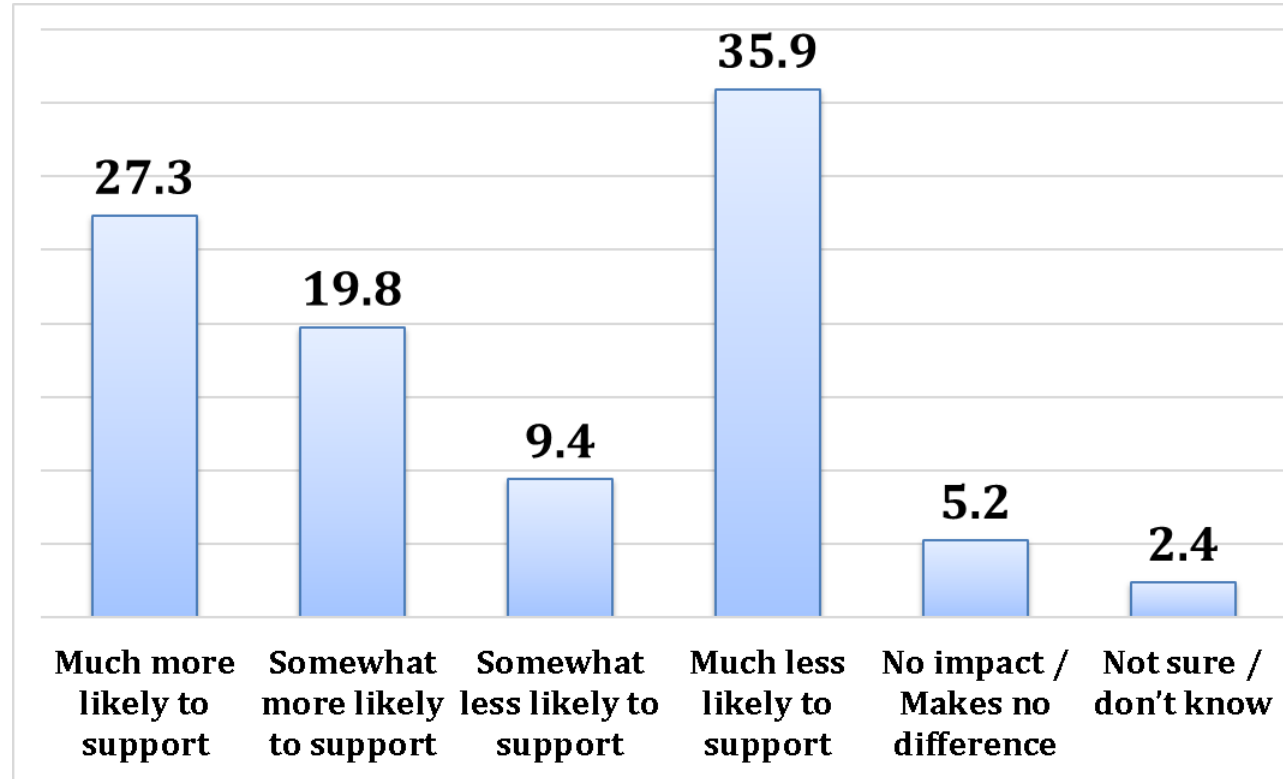

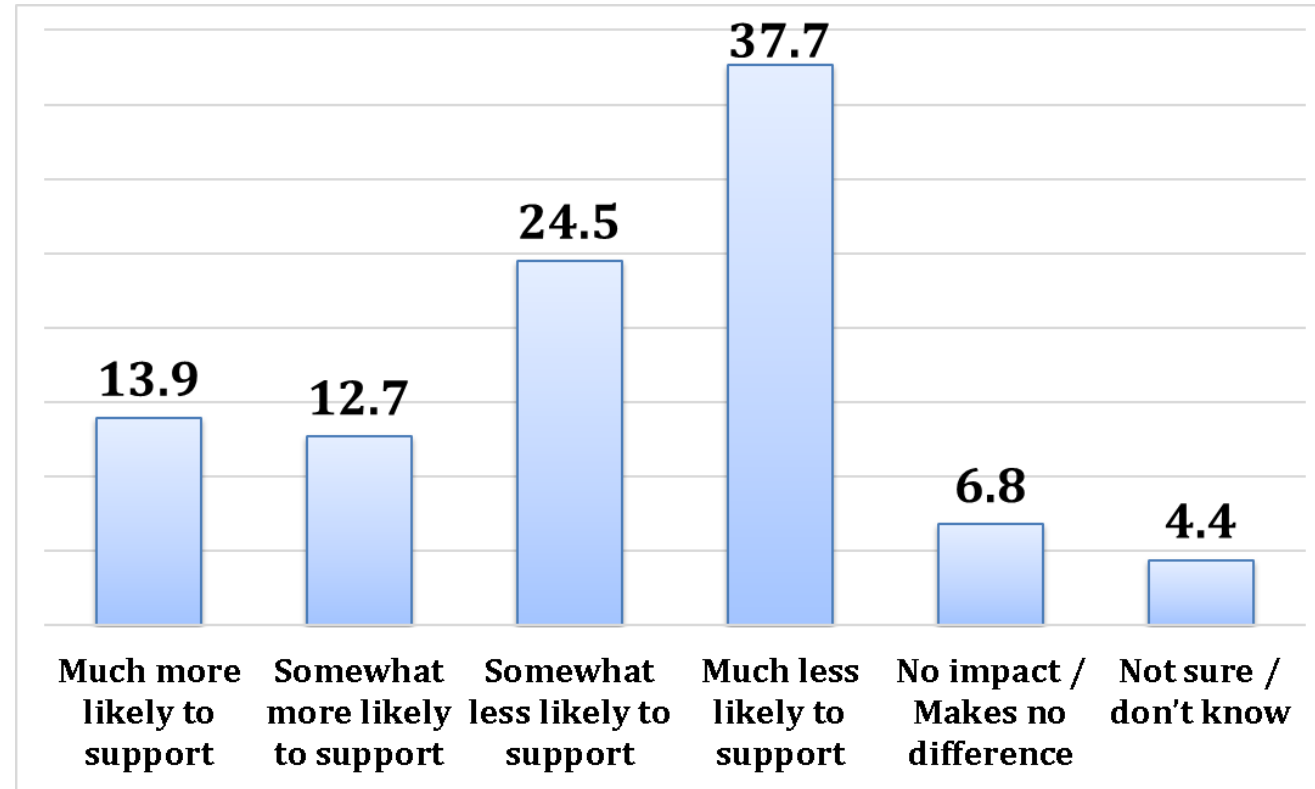

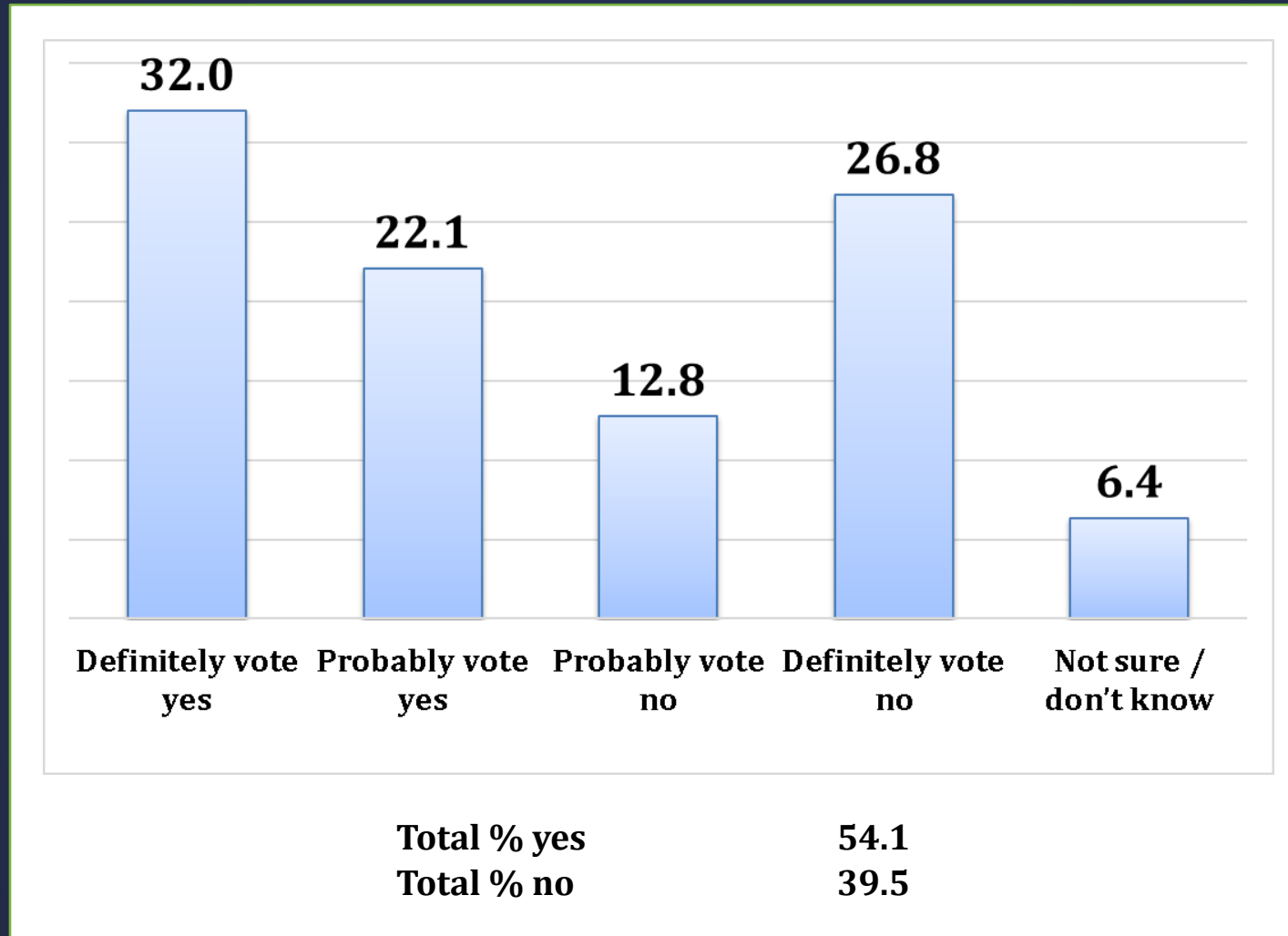

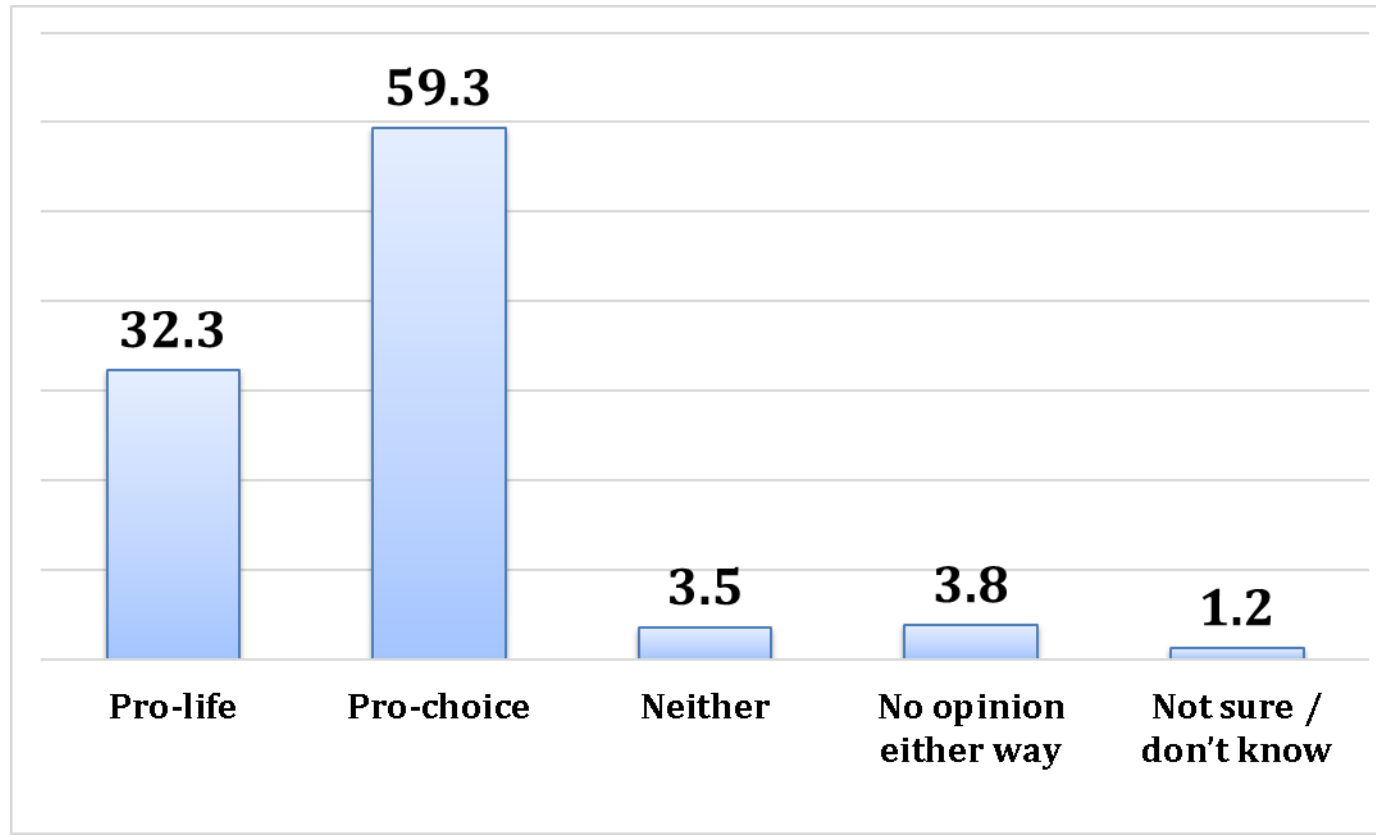

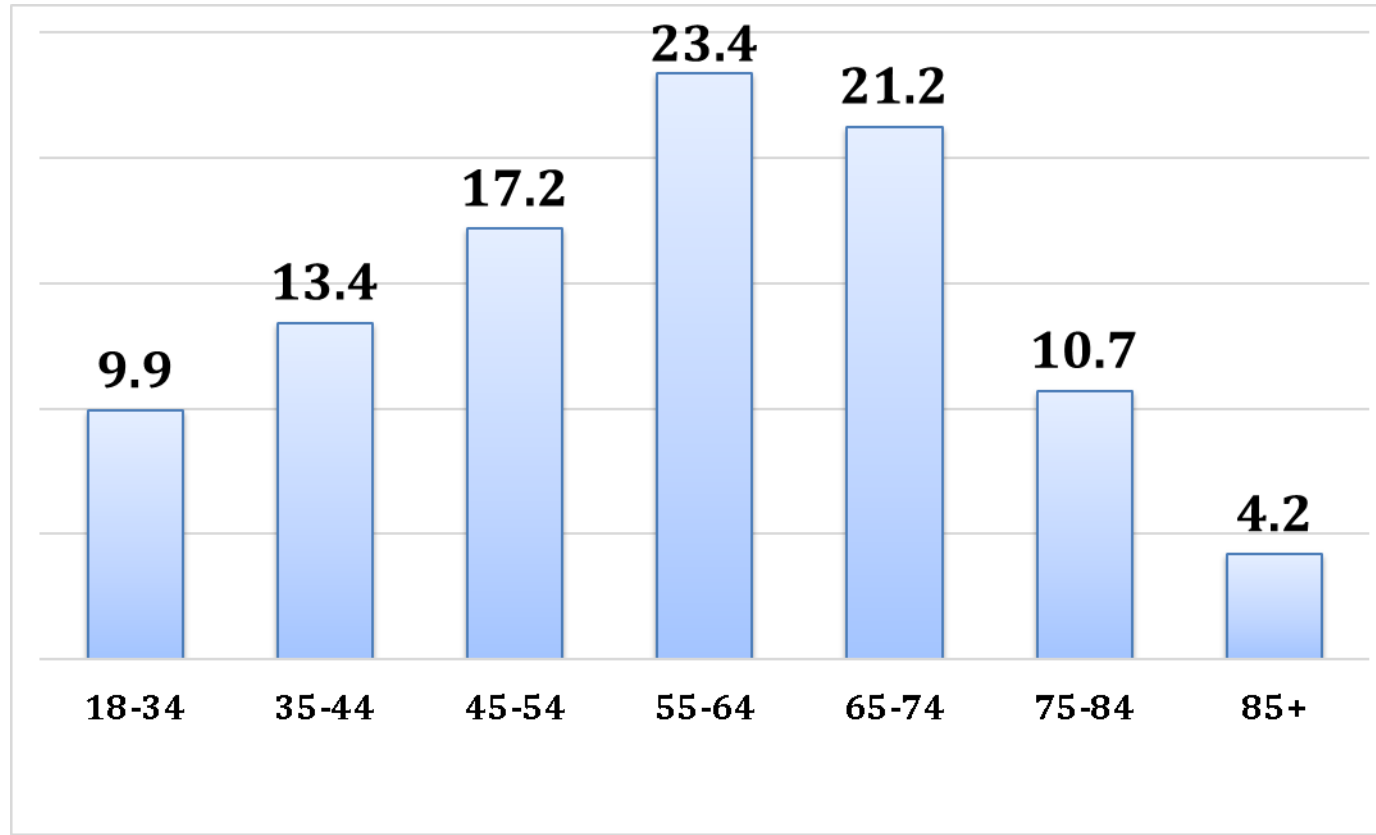

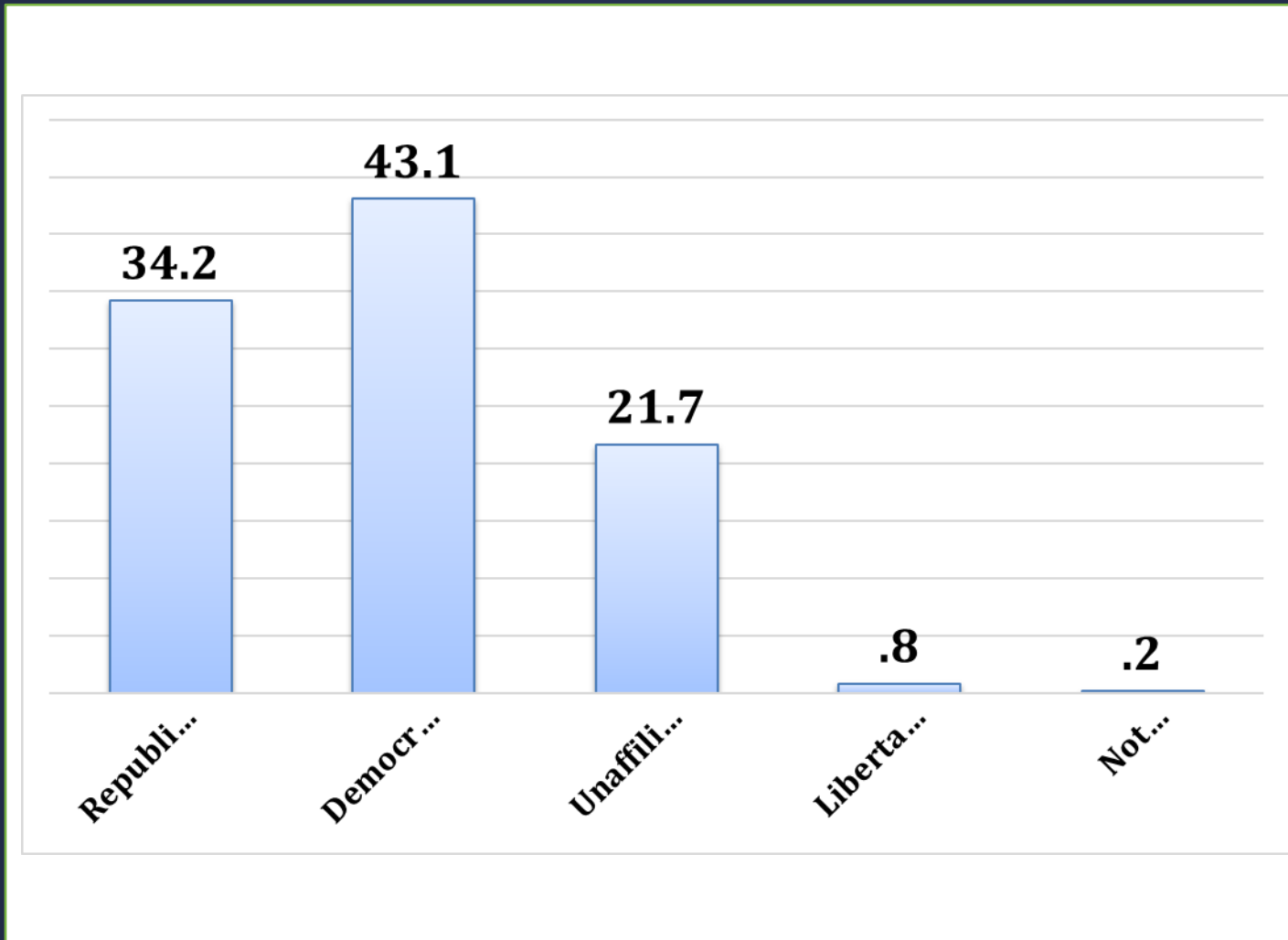
Would you generally describe your views on abortion as pro-life or pro-choice?



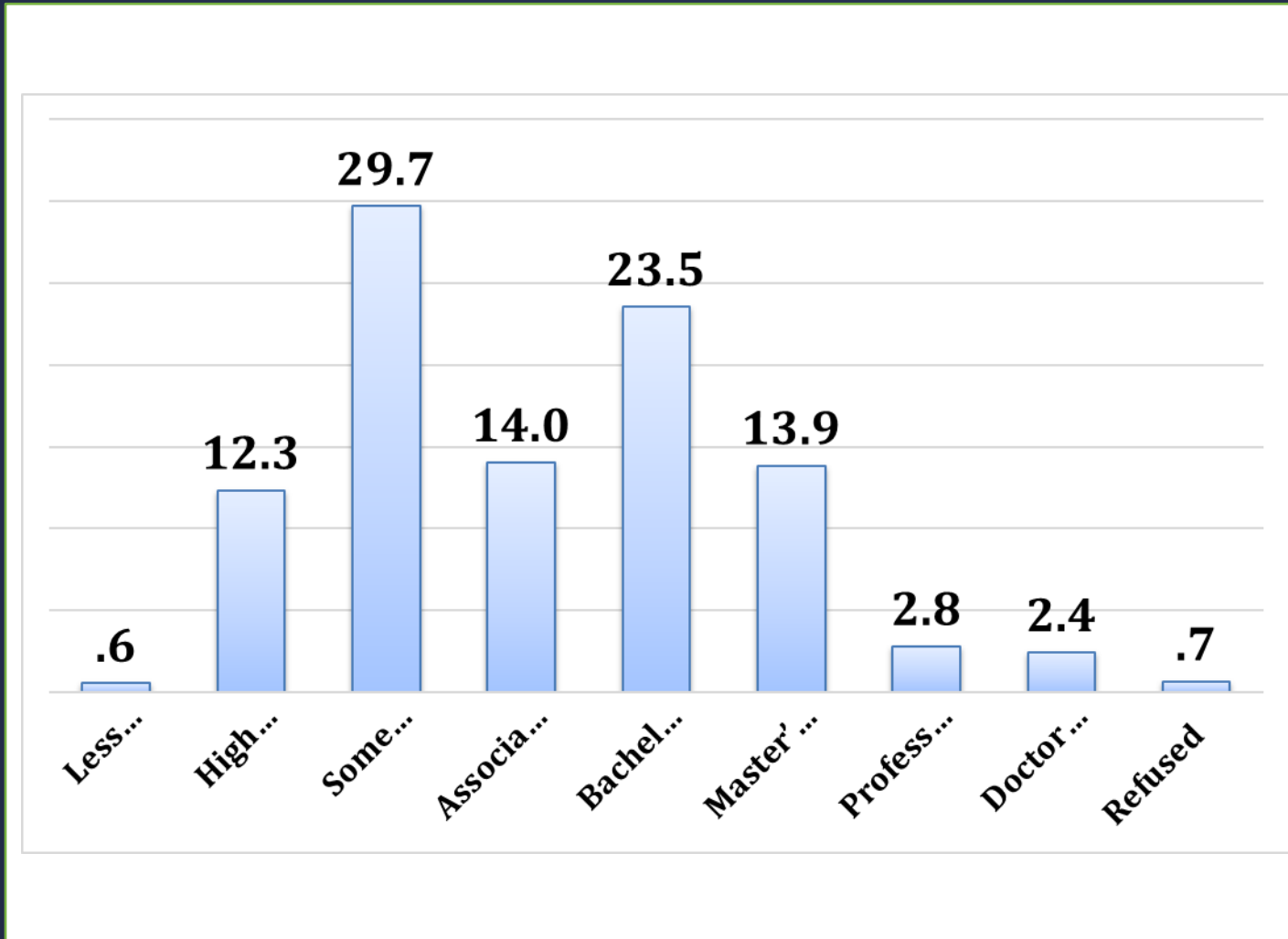
What is your age?



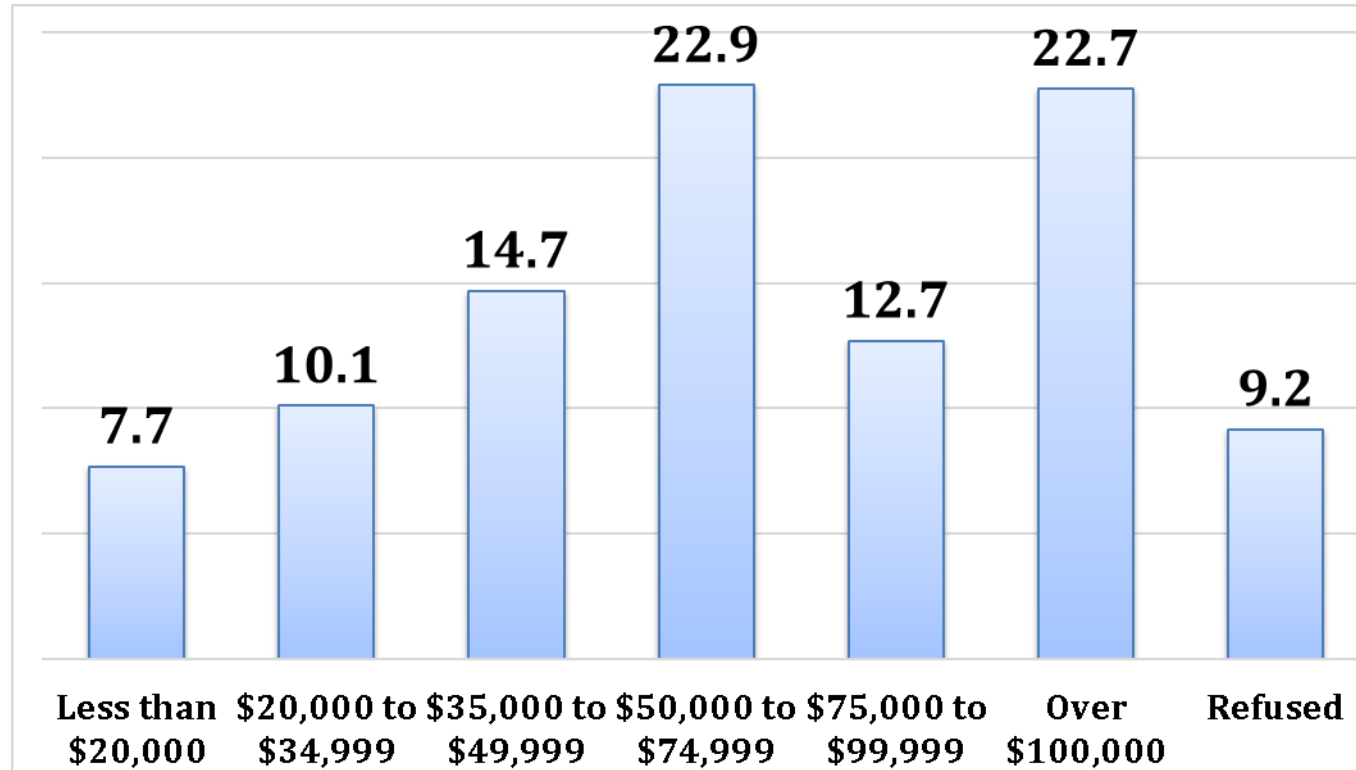
What is your current political party affiliation?



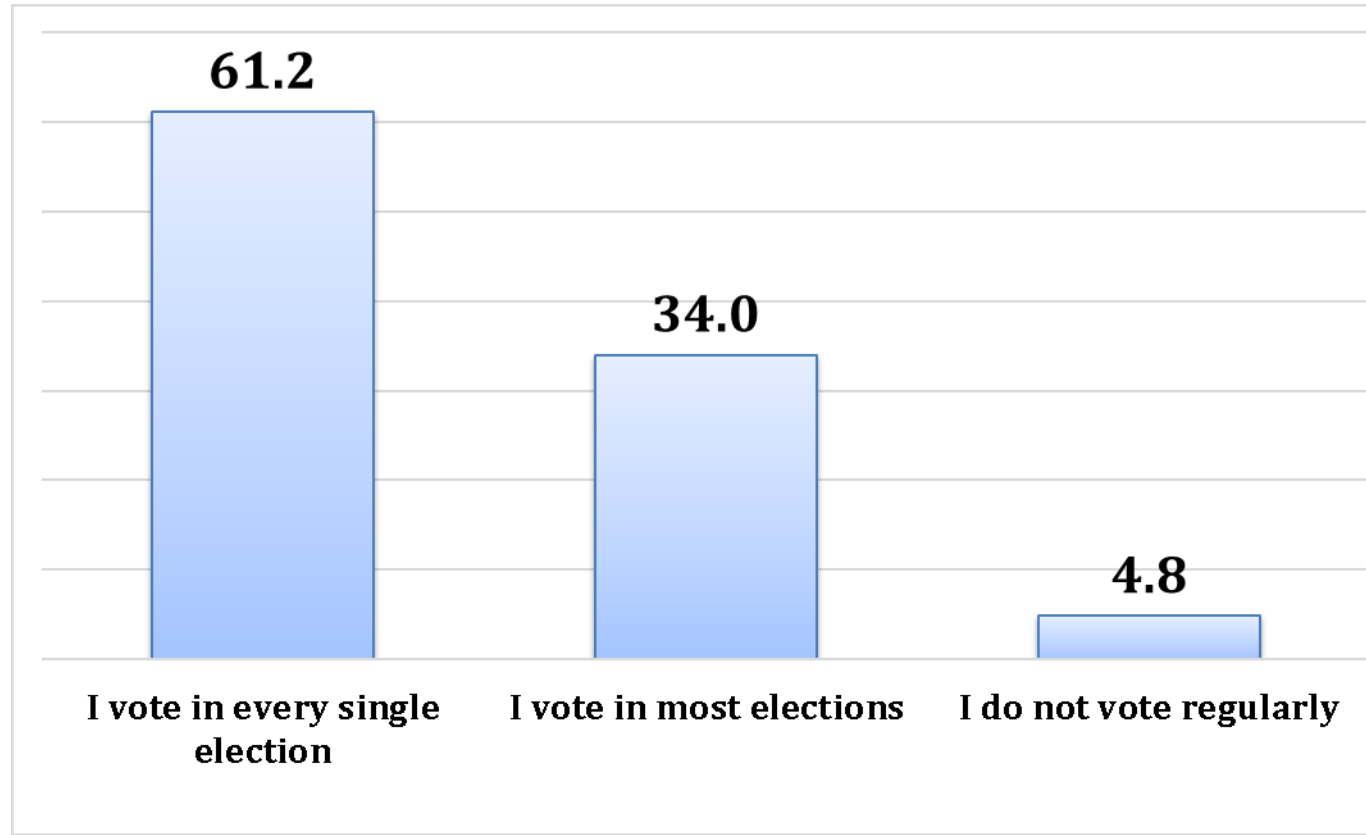
What is your highest level education you achieved?



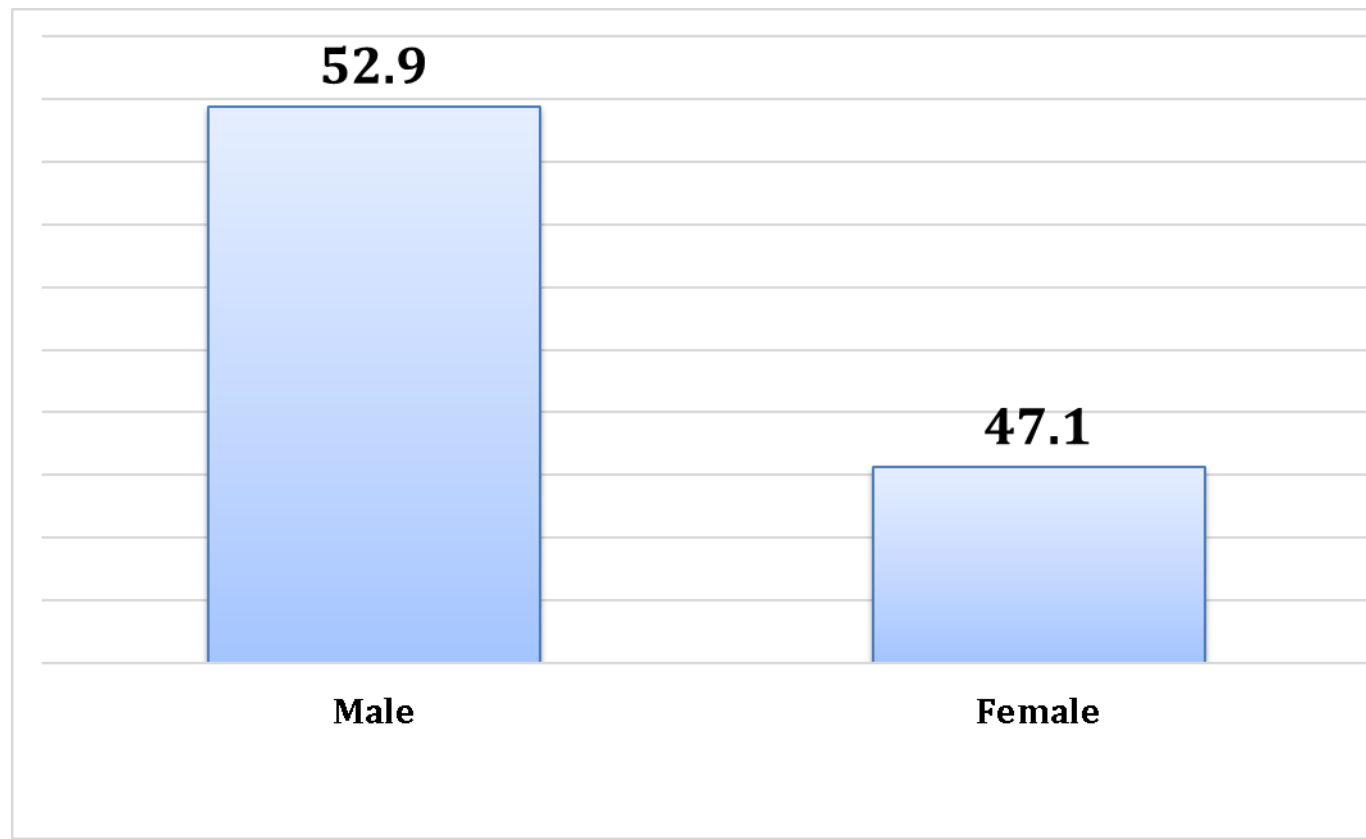
What is your approximate annual household Income?



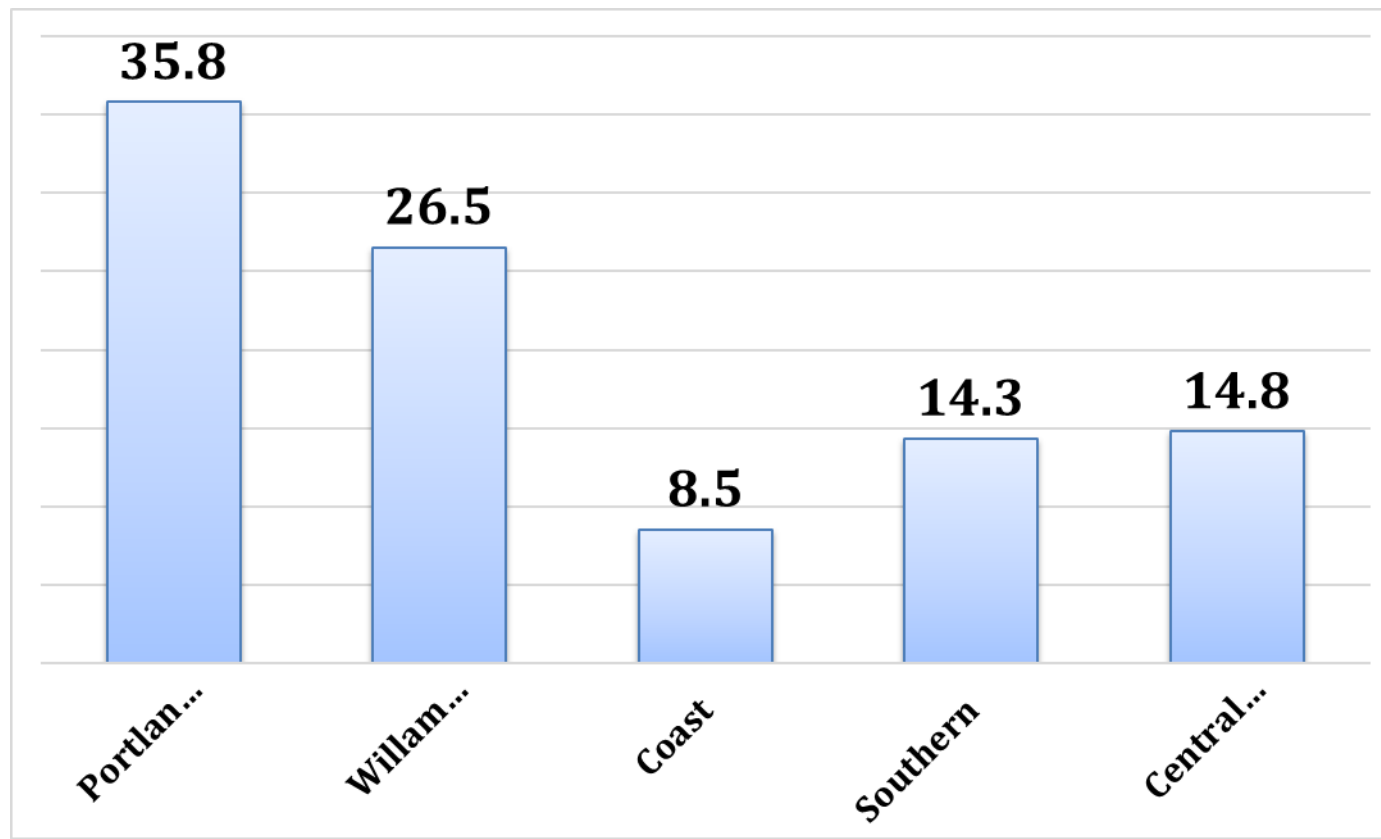
